

SUDDEN DEATH

Caleb B. Andrews, Truant Officer, Passes Away at Geo. Aumiller Home After Short Illness Yesterday Afternoon
His Death Resulted from Apoplexy Stroke

After an illness of only two hours duration, Caleb B. Andrews, attendance officer of Adams county, passed away yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the home of George Aumiller, one mile east and one mile south of Berne, death being caused from a stroke of apoplexy. Mr. Andrews was attending to his duties and had called at the Kerr school house, three miles south of Berne, at which place he was making a short address to the pupils. While talking, he became suddenly sick and started for his home, south east of Monroe. When in front of the George Aumiller home, his condition grew more serious and he was forced to stop. Local administrations were given him in the hopes of relieving his suffering and a call was sent for a physician. Dr. Parrish of Monroe answered the call and hurried to the bedside. By this time Mr. Andrews' condition was so serious that no hopes of saving his life were entertained, and at 3 o'clock death came as a relief to his sufferings.

Mr. Andrews was born in Adams county, March 25, 1866, and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Andrews. He received his education from the county schools and spent his entire life in the vicinity of his birthplace. In July, 1905, he was united in marriage and to this union three children were born, they being Alton, Francis and Isabelle, all at home. Besides his aged mother, who still resides on the old home place, and the wife and children, four brothers survive, they being George, Allison, James H., and Nathan, all of Adams county.

Mr. Andrews was serving his fourth term as attendance officer of Adams county, being first appointed to the office in 1912. This record of itself speaks most highly of the efficiency and universal satisfaction with which he handled the duties of his office, as well as the high esteem and respect held for him by his fellow citizens. Not only did he carry out his duties with the greatest of integrity, but through his kindly disposition and untiring efforts, many a child and orphan in Adams county is not located in a desirable home instead of being placed in an institution. As a husband and father, Mr. Andrews was all that could be desired, always having the welfare of his home and loved ones at heart and it is with deep grief and sorrowing that the wife and children sustain their loss.

The funeral will be held Friday afternoon at 1 o'clock from the Methodist church at Monroe of which he was a devout member, and interment will be made in the Monroe cemetery.
