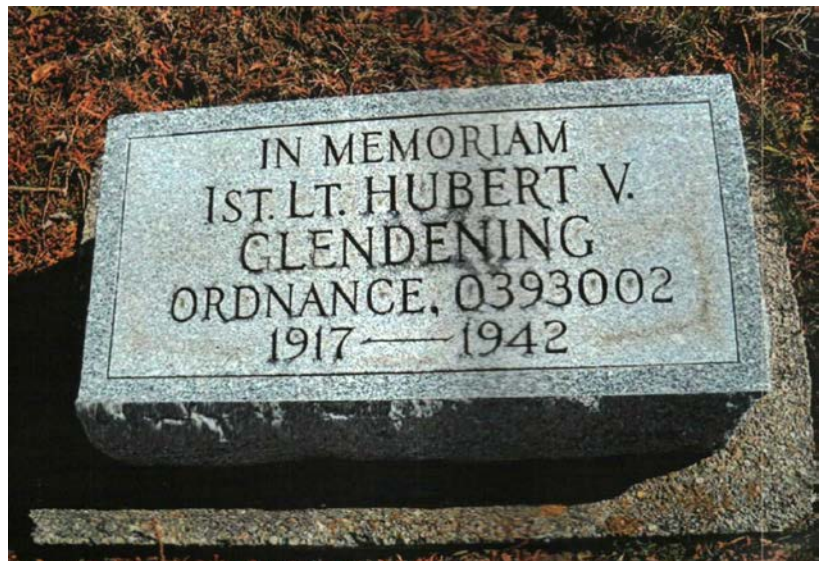

TO SETTLE ESTATE OF HUBER GLENDENING

Letters of administration were issued by Clyde O. Troutner, county clerk, in vacation, subject to court approval, to Milo B. Glendening, of Hartford township, for his son, First Lt. Hubert V. Glendening, one of the first men to be killed in World War II. The officer's estate was estimated at \$1,000 and bond for that amount was filed.

Lt. Glendening was with the American army at Pampanga in the Philippines and was reported missing on May 7, 1942, with the fall of Corregidor. Two years later, on May 7, 1944, the war department reported that it was assumed he was dead. A second son, Lt. James K. Glendening, a graduate of West Point Military academy has been reported missing in action in Italy since July 8.

RUMOR SOLDIER REPORTED DEAD IS STILL LIVING

Reports became current over the weekend that Mr. and Mrs. Milo Glendening in the Southwest part of Harford Township had word through shortwave radio that their son First Lieutenant Hubert Glendening, who has been missing since Pearl Harbor is said to be a Jap prisoner on the Philippines. After missing for two years he has been listed as officially dead. A short wave report is said to have been heard in Texas on which Hubert is supposed to have been heard. Although the family is giving little or no credence to the report, members of the family are however trying to check into the source of the report.

LT. GLENDENING'S DEATH ESTABLISHED

Parents Notified By War Department

First Lt. Hubert V. Glendening, son of Mr. and Mrs. Milo Glendening of Geneva, died on May 31, 1942 of wounds received in battle in the Philippines, the war department has notified the parents.

The date of his death was established in a letter received from the war department last Saturday. For several months, Lt. Glendening was listed as missing in action and in May 1944, the war department notified his parents that he was presumed to be dead.

The official notice eliminated all hope of the probability that he may some day be reported alive.

Lt. Glendening is a brother of First Lt. James K. Glendening, West Point officer, who returned home last week after being liberated from a German prison camp. He had been a captive since July, 1944.
