Ben Aspy at the M.E. church, Tuesday morning after which the body was laid to rest in the West Lawn Cemetery. A wife, two sons, two daughters, one brother and two sisters survive.

Truly is can be said of him that a good man has gone and the world is better for his having lived in it. His gentle kindly spirit was a constant reminder of true Christianity.
