FORMER COUNTY OFFICIAL DIES

Noah Mangold, 85, well known Decatur man, and auditor of Adams county from 1896 to 1900, died of a sudden heart attack in the dining room of his home Tuesday morning. Coroner J. Jerome Yager attributed death to heart trouble. Born in Fairfield county, Ohio, he had resided in Decatur since he was 10 years old.

He married Rachel Weldy December 2, 1880. Surviving besides the widow are a daughter, Mrs. Glenys Kern, and a sister, Mrs. Henry Krick, both of Decatur.

Funeral services will be held at the home at 2:30 p.m. Friday. Burial will be in the Decatur cemetery.

Noah Mangold Dies Suddenly

Former Adams County Auditor Dies at Decatur

Noah Mangold, 85, prominent Decatur resident and former Adams County Auditor, died suddenly Tuesday morning at 10:45 o'clock at his home on First Street.

Mr. and Mrs. Mangold had been in the basement fixing the fire in the furnace. When they came back upstairs, Mr. Mangold went into the dining room and sat down. He was found dead sitting in the chair, only a few minutes later. Coroner J. Jerome Yager attributed death to heart trouble. He had been ailing for the past week.

Mr. Mangold was, until later years, active engaged in politics and was elected County Auditor in 1896 and served in that capacity until 1900. He had been engaged as a salesman for the National Mill & Supply Company for about 16 years, retiring about 10 years ago.

He was born in Fairfield County, Ohio, April 22, 1853, the son of Abraham and Katherine Sleighbaugh-Mangold. He came to this county when a lad of 10. On December 2, 1880, he was married to Rachel Weldy who survives.

Surviving besides the widow are one daughter, Mrs. Glennys Kern and one sister, Mrs. Henry Krick, both of Decatur, two sons, a daughter, a brother and sister preceded him in death.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the home, 222 South First Street and burial will be in the Maplewood Cemetery. Rev. Kenneth Timmons will officiate.
