has not provided any means for the
support of his wife or children for
the last ten years he has wholly and
entirely neglected them. The Plaintiff
has been obliged to support herself
and children, by keeping a dry goods
store in the City of Philadelphia.
For a long time the Plaintiff main-
tained defendant up to the time
he left and abandoned her about
the year 1864. Since the defendants
desertion in 1864 the Plaintiff has lived
in the State of Indiana. The Plaintiff
has always been a sober, virtuous
and industrious woman wife and
mother. She has worked hard and
faithfully to earn a livelihood for
her children since 1864 at which
time her husband ceased contrib-
uting to her support.
