FAMILY OF 12; FAILURE OF AUTO MOTOR IS BLAMED

Grabill Residents Aid Undertakers in Carrying Bodies of Victims From Beside Railroad Tracks

Grabill turned out en masse to do what it could to help at the scene of the train-automobile wreck which proved fatal to the Marion McBride family, of Rural Route No. 1, and aided undertakers in removing the bodies of victims from where they were hurled by the locomotive of a speeding Wabash passenger train. Little assistance could be given victims of the tragedy, however, as only four of the number were still breathing when reached. The others were laid out under tarpaulins near the tracks, in a store room and in the railroad station while the injured were rushed to St. Joseph's Hospital in an ambulance which met private cars en route. Two of the injured died on the way to the hospital, one lingered for a few hours and the last one, Phyllis, aged 5, died at 9:05 a.m. today.
