JACOB MOSER DIES IN FALL FROM HAY WAGON

Tragic Happening Occurrs Late Monday; Suffers Broken Neck

FUNERAL HELD THIS AFTERNOON

A well-known farmer of this community, Jacob F. Moser, age 58, met a tragic death late Monday afternoon. He fell from a hay wagon and suffered a broken neck. Death was instant. The accident happened on the farm of a neighbor, Peter Mosser, at about 3:30 o'clock, several miles southwest of Berne.

The funeral was held this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at the home and at 2 o'clock at the West Missionary church, Rev. Alfred Clauser of Ft. Wayne, former pastor of the church, officiating. Burial was in the MRE Cemetery.

Moser was riding on a load of hay with his son Harry, and daughter Dorothy, in the hay field. Just exactly how the fatal fall took place could not be explained by either of the children. They had barely started loading the hay on the hay ladder when Mr. Moser accidently touched the daughter's feet with the prongs of the fork while placing some hay. When Mr. Moser inquired whether it hurt and she replied that it had not, the team of horses which had a habit of stopping when someone talked, halted and in some manner threw him off the load. Very little hay had been taken on the wagon with the loader, it was explained, but the manner in which he fell, on his head, caused sudden death. His son Harry stated that his father was dead when he reached him.

An ambulance and a physician were called immediately, however, but the man was dead.

Jacob Moser and Peter Mosser had agreed to exchange work, the former to make hay and the latter to plow corn, recently. The deceased had completed the work with the side delivery rake and had taken the team back to the barn. When his son and daughter were ready to return to the field, their father asked whether he should go along to help them with the work. When they replied in the affirmative, they left the barn and began their work. Shortly afterwards came the fatal fall.

Mr. Moser was the son of Peter F. and Elizabeth Wulliman Moser and was born in French township, May 4, 1878. His first wife died many years ago and on May 18, 1919, he was married to Lillian Mertz.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Lillian Mertz Moser; two sons, Harry of Hartford township and Franklin of near Linn Grove from the first marriage; two daughters, Dorothy and Edwinna from the second marriage at home; six brothers, Edward of Warsaw, Albert of Ligonier, David of Woodburn, Peter, Joel and Noah Moser of Monroe township; two sisters, Mrs. Aldine Fox of French township and Mrs. Dan Huser of Syracuse, Kansas. Four grandchildren also survive.

One daughter, Verena, from the first marriage died and one child, Helen May, from the second mar- (cut off)

BIXLER RITES ARE HELD HERE THIS AFTERNOON

Abraham Bixler, 86, Dies Here Early Tuesday Morning

Abraham Bixler, aged 86, well-known retired farmer and for the past several months a resident of Berne, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John Burke, on east Water street, at 3 o'clock Tuesday morning. Mr. Burke had been in failing health for some time and became bedfast five days before his death.

Mr. Bixler was born in Switzerland, September 6, 1849. He came to this country when a small lad and on August 21, 1875 was married to Barbara Nussbaum, who preceded him in death. He had made his home with the Burke family for the last 13 years. The family lived on farms in this community for many years and Mr. Bixler was widely known.

The Bixler family lived in Wabash township southeast of Berne for some time, then west of Berne and also at one time north of town where the Sylvan Sprunger family now lives.

Surviving are the following eight children: Mrs. John Burke, Berne; John Bixler, Geneva; Jacob, Hesperia, Michigan; Judith Bixler, Ft. Wayne; Adam, Berne; Ben, Geneva; William, South Bend and Mrs. Henry Moser, who with her husband, is engaged in missionary work in Africa. A brother, Sol Bixler of Geneva and one sister, Mrs. Mary Kiener, of Bluffton, Ohio, also survive.

The funeral was held this afternoon at 1:45 o'clock at the Burke home and at 2 o'clock at the Mennonite church, Rev. C. H. Suckau officiating. Burial was in the MRE Cemetery.
