***** March 27, 1937 CLAIMED BY DEATH MISS Alma Cecile Girard

Miss Alma Cecil Girard, aged 20, 1115 ½ Lake Avenue, died unexpectedly of quinsy and stroptococcic infection of the throat Sunday about 3:45 p.m. at the Methodist Hospital. She was a bookkeeper and stenographer in WPA offices here, and had been ill about five days.

Miss Girard was rushed to the hospital after her physician had found her suffering from strangulation about 2 o'clock in her apartment. He made an emergency incision in the girl's windpipe to permit her to breathe.

The deceased was a lifelong resident of Fort Wayne and was graduated from St. Augustine's Academy in 1934. She was a member of the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. Surviving are the father, and stepmother, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Girard, of this city; a sister, Miss Bernice Girard, and three brothers, Ralph, Richard and Robert Girard, all of this city. Saturday, 1937 VICTIMS OF SCHOOL BLAST BURIED WHILE COURT PROBES CAUSE Steady Stream of Hearses Carries 455 Bodies To Texas Cemeteries Gas Accumulation Blamed For Tragedy Investigation Is Made In The Hope Of Preventing Similar Accidents NEW LONDON, Tex, March 20.-(A.P.)-Burials of its 455 school blast victims occupied the village of death today while the full force of a military inquiry sought the cause of the worst catastrophe of its kind in modern times.

Soon after sun-up the great procession of funerals began. From churches, private homes and funeral chapels, hearses streamed to burial grounds. Volunteer ministers from over the vast East Texas oil region performed continuous services with almost clock-like precision.
