Mother of Mrs. Chris Neuenschwander Dies In Pennsylvania

Mrs. Elizabeth Zook, 77, wife of Jonas Zook of Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, died suddenly sometime Monday evening, according to word received here. Mrs. Zook was the mother of Mrs. Chris Neuenschwander, living on the Burkhalter place one mile north of town. Mrs. Neuenschwander was formerly Mrs. David Graber.

Mrs. Zook was born in Lancaster county and spent her entire life there. She visited in this community several times.

The funeral will be Friday forenoon. Simon Lehman of this place motored Mr. and Mrs. Neuenschwander and other members of the family to Pennsylvania after word had been received of Mrs. Zook's death.

MRS. NOAH WINTEREGG IS DEATH'S VICTIM

Well Known Woman Dies Near Here Just Before Noon Today

Mrs. Sarah Winteregg, aged 67, wife of Noah Winteregg, died at 11:15 this forenoon. Death occurred at the Ezra Wanner home in Hartford township, just south of the Jimtown river bridge. Mr. and Mrs. Winteregg had made their home with the Wanner family for some time. Death was caused by cancer and complications.

Mrs. Winteregg had been bedfast for ten weeks. She had been ailing for two years. Mr. and Mrs. Winteregg had lived on a farm west of Berne for many years, and the deceased was well known here.

Mrs. Winteregg was born August 31, 1868, in French township. She was a daughter of Jacob and Anna Stuckey Schindler. At the time of her death, she was 67 years, 10 months and 29 days old.

The deceased was united in marriage to Noah Winteregg, Jan. 15, 1893. The wedding took place at the Defenseless Mennonite Church.

Surviving are the husband and the following children: Mrs. Ezra Wanner, of southwest of Berne; Mrs. Edwin Moser, Elroy Winteregg and Raymond Winteregg, all of this community. Two brothers also survive, Sam Schindler of Ft. Wayne and Henry Schindler of Van Nuys, Calif.

One son, Elmer, died in infancy. Two brothers preceded, David Schindler and Amos Schindler.

Mrs. Winteregg was a member of the West Missionary Church.

The funeral will be held at 1:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the home and at 2 o'clock at the West Missionary Church, with Rev. Alfred Clauser and Rev. C. J. Gerig officiating. Burial will be in the M. R. E. Cemetery.

Mrs. Alice Augsburger, aged 55, wife of Rev. Daniel Augsburger, died at her home near Dayton, Ohio at 4 o'clock (CST) Tuesday evening. Mrs. Augsburger had been bedfast for six years, suffering from paralysis and complications.

Short funeral services will be held at the home near Dayton Friday morning, after which the body will be removed to the home of a brother, Noah Stauffer west of Berne.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Defenseless Mennonite church Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, following a brief service at the Stauffer home at 1:30. Rev. B. B. King of Elida, Ohio, will officiate.

Mrs. Augsburger was born in Hartford township, December 20, 1880, the daughter of Samuel and Malina Christman Stauffer. She lived in this community until 14 years ago when they moved to the place where they now lived.

Her marriage to Rev. Augsburger took place in French township, August 27, 1903.

Surviving are the husband, two brothers, Noah of west of Berne and Reuben and two sisters, Mrs. Perry Rumble of Wabash and Mrs. Roy McClure of Oracle, Arizona.
