HEAVY RAIN FLOODS STREAMS AND LOWLANDS North Part of Berne Resembles Lake Today; Cold May Halt Threat of Flood

Rain which fell at intervals Wednesday and practically all night last night, flooded lowlands in this community and brought a genuine flood threat to farmers living along rivers and in bottom lands. Scores of basements were flooded in Berne and community, and the north part of Berne resembled a big lake this morning. The total rainfall Wednesday and last night amounted to 1.49 inches, according to H. M. Reusser. Rain was again falling at intervals today.

To Be Colder

Much colder weather will follow the rain, according to weather predictions. Snow today may also hit this community. A severe cold wave is predicted for the northwest.

New High Mark

Many local people claim the high water was higher here last night than ever before. The water was across Federal Highway 27 in the north part of Berne. In the vicinity of the Highway Hatchery and from there east as far as the Nazarene church, all the low ground was under water, at places several feet deep. Other low parts of the town were flooded and many families were busy today in getting water out of their basements.

On West Main Street, the water rose over the sidewalks during the night. The lot where the new post office is to be built is flooded.

Creeks were swollen this morning from the heavy rain. Some were out of their banks and the water was spreading into the lowlands. The Wabash river was rising rapidly today and will no doubt go far out of its banks. In the canope district many acres were under water this forenoon.

Fields throughout the community were flooded. From Geneva comes the report that the Limberlost south of Geneva is on a rampage and flooding hundreds of acres of bottom land. At Portland principal streets of the city were under water this morning, according to reports. At Bluffton the Wabash river is rising rapidly today, according to a statement from that city.

The rain was general throughout this part of the country and unless the predicted cold spell checks the flood water, great damage may be caused at places.
