SECOND EARTH TREMOR ROCKS THIS COMMUNITY Distinct Jar Felt Here Shortly Before Midnight Monday Night

The second earth tremor inside of a week rocked Berne and community shortly before midnight Monday night. Two distinct shocks [some words appear to missing] seconds, according to most people. Tuesday morning, March 2, shortly before 9 o'clock a tremor also shook this community.

The Monday night tremor was accompanied by a low rumbling sound, which many people said sounded like distant thunder. People who were in bed report that their beds rocked violently. Windows and doors rattled and buildings swayed. No injury or damage is reported in this community, but many people were badly scared. A large number of people were aroused from deep slumber by the quake.

The seismograph owned by H. M. Reusser swayed about one-eighth of an inch, indicating that the tremor was of about the same intensity as the one last week. Because of the quietness of the night, the tremor this week was probably felt more than the one the week previous, many experts state.

The quake this week was felt throughout Eastern and Central Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, W. Virginia, Illinois, Michigan and parts of Wisconsin. It is thought that the center of the quake was about 90 miles north of Cincinnati, and was caused by the tumbling of rocks far below the surface of the earth.

Funeral for Widely Known Woman Is Held Sunday

Mrs. Rose Gehrig Mosier, 78, wife of Frank Mosure, widely known man of Vera Cruz, died Friday morning at about 8:00 o'clock after an extended illness. She had been bedfast for many months and was an invalid for many years.

The deceased was a [a few words illegible] daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ulrich Gehrig near Linn Grove. The family later moved to Fort Wayne.

Her marriage to Mr. Mosure was an event of March 1, 1884. They were married 53 years ago last Monday.

Surviving her are the husband, an adopted daughter, Mrs. Bessie Reynolds of Vera Cruz, and a sister, Mrs. Mary Amstutz of Fort Recovery, Ohio. A half-sister, Mrs. Hosea Martz of this place and a half-brother, John Grimm of Michigan also survive.

Sisters preceding were Mrs. Bertha Meyer, Mrs. Christina Kuntz, Mrs. Katy Stauffer, all of this place and Mrs. Benedict Mosure of Bluffton.

Mrs. Mosure was a member of the Vera Cruz Reformed church where funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 1:00 o'clock following a brief service at the home. Rev. H. H. Meckstroth, pastor of the church officiated.
