Mr. and Mrs. Steury, Sam Nussbaum, Lydia Nussbaum and Emmet Orr were were on their way to Berne from Lafayette where they had attended the Agricultural Conference. Skidding on the snow and ice-covered streets, the car ran across the curbing and hit a tree, smashing a fender, running board and doing other damage.

Miss Nussbaum received a slight bruise on her head but no one else was injured.

A car driven by C. T. Habegger also slid into the ditch on the way to Berne from Lafayette the same night, but only minor damages were inflicted.

PILOT IN AIR LINER CRASH

Former Adams County Young Man

Gerald V. Marshall, pilot of the ill-fated American Airline transport plane which crashed in a swamp near Goodwin, Ark., is a former Adams County resident, it has been learned here. The young man lived at Peterson. Marshall also visited the Bluffton street fair in 1935, in company with Clyde Shockley, well-known Muncie pilot.

The Marshall family formerly resided on what is known as the William Weldy farm, south of Peterson. His father, Lewis Marshall, lives at Lafayette.

The pilot's brother, Royce Marshall, married Miss Mabel Weldy, of Peterson. He died several years ago and Mrs. Marshall is a teacher in the Peterson schools.

Marshall was one of 17 persons killed in the crash. The big air liner fell in a dense swamp and all on board were killed.

Residents in and around Peterson speak very highly of the young man.

Robert Kramer, assistant special agent for the department of financial institutions of Indiana at the People's State Bank here, took his first airplane ride with the late Gerald V. Marshall, pilot of the American Airline transport plane which crashed near Goodwin, Ark., last week.

Mr. Marshall's home was in Peru, as is Mr. Kramer's. Mr. Marshall was especially popular in Peru because of the rides in his Waco plane with which he treated his friends. He was considered one of the best pilots in the country.
