Business will be suspended here all day next Monday, on Labor Day. None of the factories or general stores will be open, and the bank and postoffice will be closed all day. Several local people are planning to attend the state fair at Indianapolis, while

many others planned fishing or sight seeing trips.

The town of Berne will return to Standard time at mid-night next Monday, September 2. Fast time has been in effect here since early May. The change is being made at this

time for the convenience of school teachers and pupils as some of the country people
