Pretty Summer Wedding Takes Place Sunday

In one of the prettiest ceremonies of the summer months, Miss Majeska, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harve Ineichen, living east of Geneva, became the bride of Virgil Amstutz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Amstutz of this city. The double ring

ceremony was performed by Rev. Claude Fawns, pastor of the Methodist church in Geneva, where the bride and groom exchanged vows at four o'clock yesterday afternoon before an altar of summer flowers, in the presence of about 200 friends and relatives.

Preceding the ceremony, Mrs. Claude Fawns, church organist, presented a 15 minute musicale including the following selections, "Because," "Drink To Me Only With Thine Eyes" and "All For You." The traditional Lohengrin and Mendelssohn Wedding marchers were used for the processional and recessional, and "I Love You Truly" played softly during the ceremony by the organist. The Misses Catherine Mettler and Betty Schindler, former college classmates sang "The Sunshine of Your Smile," followed by a vocal solo "O Promise Me" by Mrs. Glen Neuenschwander.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was charming in a floor length period gown of pink frosted organdy, fashioned along Queen Louise lines. Her pink tulle veil fell to the shoulders from a bandeau of pink rose buds. She carried a bouquet of pink Better Times roses with blue baby's breath, and wore a gold brooch which belonged to her great-grandmother.

Immediately after the wedding, a reception was held at the home of the bride's parents for members of the bridal party and immediate families. Refreshments of ice cream and punch were served, with a beautiful 3-tier wedding cake.
