## 4-YEAR-OLD SUFFERS POSSIBLE SKULL FRACTURE IN WINDSTORM

PORTLAND, Ind., Nov. 12 - Rosemarie Schmidt, four-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Schmidt, suffered a possible skull fracture and bruises about the head and body when she was pinned beneath a large sheet of metal roofing blown off during a storm which swept the county late Monday afternoon.

The wind removed the entire roof from the Hawkins building on West Main Street and carried it to the intersection of Main and Meridian streets, the distance of one block.

The child and her mother were on the sidewalk when the gale struck. The large smokestack at the Eagles Club was blown down on the furnace room. Large electric globes were broken, signs razed and farmers reported several small losses, such as doors torn off, windows broken and gates demolished.
