CHICKEN HOUSE TOPPLES IN WIND; KILLS FARMER

Harold Roebuck, 26, a farmer living near Zanesville, on the Felchner Road, was killed during Monday's windstorm when a chicken house on his farm toppled over on him, crushing his chest. He was pinned under the wreckage for about 50 minutes after the accident, which occurred about 2:30 p.m. He was brought to St. Joseph's Hospital and placed under an oxygen tent. His lungs, however, had collapsed. The chicken house weighed about three tons.

The Mennonite Men's chorus of this place gave two concerts Sunday, one at South Bend and one at Goshen. At South Bend the group was shown around the Notre Dame campus.

Pastor William Fetler, a native of Russia who escaped from that country in 1914 after being sentenced to prison, is in Berne to have his life story published in book form. He has been a missionary for many years.

Miss Lydia Hilty and Jacob Schwartz, two well known young people of the Amish faith and both living in this community, were united in marriage last Sunday. Many members of the congregation attended the wedding and dinner and supper was served at the home of the bride's parents.

The Rev. N. J. Schmucker, pastor of the Defenseless Mennonite church west of Berne, is starting a series of revival meetings at the Grabill church of the same denomination this week. He will conduct services there for two weeks.

The L. S. Electric shop owned by Warren Lehman and John Schindler has dissolved partnership, with Mr. Schindler taking over the shop. Lehman plans to go to Charleston, Indiana, in the south part of the state, where a huge powder plant is being built, to do electrical wiring work.
