Former Prominent Decatur Resident Dies At Bluffton Home

Eli Sprunger, 78, for many years a resident of Decatur, died suddenly at 11:30 o'clock Tuesday night at his home, 412 East Market street, in Bluffton. His wife, overcome by shock, fainted and was unable to summon aid until after 2 o'clock this morning.

Mr. Sprunger for many years was an importer of Belgian horses, and was recognized as one of the leading stockmen of the middle west. He served several years as a judge at the international livestock exposition at Chicago.

He was born in Wells county January 21, 1863, the son of Abraham and Katherine Moser-Sprunger. He married Susan Riesen in Berne in 1888. He was a member of the Mennonite church at Berne.

Surviving besides the widow are a daughter, Mrs. Harry Starr of Bluffton; a son, Leo Sprunger of Saginaw, Mich.; three sos [sic] (should be brothers) Lewis and Amos Sprunger of Berne and Abraham of Fort Wayne, and two sisters, Mrs. J. Paul Rohrer, son of the late Fred Rohrer of Berne, was killed just east of Berne when his home-made plane crashed on November 30, 1916. Paul was probably the first aviator in Adams county and was making a test flight when the ship went out of control and plunged to the ground.

Brookmeyer, who are both connected with the Meshberger Brothers Stone company, have leased a building near the quarry for the production of bricks and some form of a cement block for building purposes. And as one of them expressed it, a family gathering at the home two miles north of Berne, resembles a mass convention - and it was pointed out they are all hearty eaters, thus it takes plenty of food.

Mr. Schwartz, 59, and Mrs. Schwartz, 63, members of the Amish faith, have 14 living children, all married - the youngest of whom is 20, the oldest 40. Six are boys and eight are girls. In addition to the sons-in-law and daughters-in-law acquired by marriage, the family boasts no less than 64 grandchildren, making a total of 94 in the family.

Family gatherings at the homestead are quite frequent and the traffic is heavy near the farm for a time prior to and after the gatherings.

The members of the family are well known in and out of their old Order of Amish Mennonites. They have made their marks in various walks, including school work. One of the daughters, Anna, at one time made the highest scholastic record of any students in the county. Later, Jacob, a son, made the second highest rating. Both Mr. and Mrs. Schwartz are of French descent and most of the family members live in Adams county.

BERNE, Ind., April 3 - An overflow crowd attended the funeral for Otto Smith, Jr., 23, Fort Wayne aviator who was killed Sunday when his plane crashed on the Menas Wulliman farm, northwest of Berne. The funeral was held at the Cross Reformed Church Wednesday afternoon and burial was made in the MRE Cemetery west of Berne, the body being laid at the side of his father who was killed in a plane crash in 1927.

A number of well known Fort Wayne pilots attended the service. While the funeral was in progress several planes circled the church. The funeral was preached by the Rev. Russell Weiler, pastor of the Pleasant Dale Church of the Brethren, of which Smith was a member. Pall bearers were Herman Wulliman, Noah and Evan Yake, Freeman Ste?ler, Oscar Brown and Fred Fosnaugh.

DECATUR, Ind., April 9 - A verdict of accidental death due to injuries from an airplane crash was filed with the county clerk here ?? the coroner in the death of Otto Smith, Jr., fatally injured near Berne Sunday.

Coroner Jerome Yager's verdict included the statement that "investigation showed that he (Smith) inadvertently permitted his plane to lose ?? speed while completing a tight turn over the Wulliman farm at low altitude, causing the plane to stall and dive nose first into the ground."
