Miss Lena Zuercher, daughter of Abraham and Elizabeth Tschantz Zuercher was born near Apple Creek, O., Jan. 23, 1864, and died at the home of a niece, Mrs. Ray Chaney at Canton, on Sept. 11, 1941, at the age of 77 years, 8 months and 29 days. She spent practically all her life in this community, and is the last surviving member of her family, preceded by her parents, a sister and a brother. She is survived by three nieces and two nephews and a host of other relatives and friends. Her life has left its mark by the blessed memories of her many ministrations. The text used by Rev. Bixler, He Giveth His Beloved Sleep, was very fitting as Miss Zuercher had been a sufferer mentally and physically during the last months of her life. She was laid to rest in the Kidron church cemetery from where funeral services took place on Sunday afternoon.

Harry, four-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Weaver southwest of Orrville, met a tragic death on Monday afternoon while he was visiting on the William Mullet farm south of Kidron with his mother and brother and sister. The children were playing in the barn yard where manure was being loaded on the spreader, and the little fellow climbed on it for a ride. As the driver had started his team to unload in the field, the small tot decided to join the other children in their play, and without warning proceeded to descend before the driver could stop the team or draw the child to safety. He fell beneath the heavy wheels which passing over his abdomen, crushed him to death. He lived only a few minutes afterwards. Besides his parents, the child is survived by a brother and two sisters, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John Weaver of Barrs Mills, and Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Mil- (cut off)...services take place from the home of a neighbor of the child's parents on Wednesday afternoon.
