The city's second case of infantile paralysis was reported today, a check with the offices of Dr. R. E. Daniels, secretary of the city board of health revealed.

Elizabeth Graliker, 15, a Decatur Catholic high school student and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Graliker, is reported suffering from the disease at her home on First street.

The girl first became ill last Friday. Her condition was considerably better Monday and Tuesday, it was reported, but she complained of a severe backache on Wednesday. A physician was summoned and today he diagnosed her illness as infantile paralysis and reported the case to the city health office.
