Surviving is the son Forrest, a sister Mrs. Grace Hunsicker of Hamilton. A son Carl preceded him.

Funeral services will be held at the Geneva Methodist church, of which he was a member, on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Burial will be in the Decatur cemetery. Rev. Claude Fawns will officiate.

LAD DRIVES TRACTOR THROUGH BANK BARN PULLING LOAD OF HAY THURS.

Seldom a hay making season passes without producing a strange accident, and the present harvest is no exception. A most unusual mishap occurred at the Walter Lehman farm a short distance northwest of town at 5:00 yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Lehman and several of his sons were putting up hay and when one of the loads was being drawn into the barn by a Ford tractor, the lad operating it, failed to get the tractor stopped, driving it right through the bank barn, catapulting it down on a soft manure pile for a drop of some ten or twelve feet. No one was injured and because of the "soft" landing the tractor was only slightly damaged. After the nose dive it fell over on its side.

Milton, 11, was driving the wagon, and his cousin, Jerry Lehman, also 11, was riding with him. The latter jumped clear of the falling tractor but dashed to the house as fast as he could run to clean up the mess he got into, as soon as he saw everything else was not too bad.

Milton had been operating the tractor all afternoon pulling the wagon and loader while his father loaded. Joseph, a smaller boy, followed behind as gleaner. Norman and Gerald worked in the mow. All had gone good until on this particular load, when somehow Milton failed to get the tractor stopped. Walter and Joseph were on the load going into the barn and they saw themselves going toward the opening, but when the tractor fell, the wagon tongue broke, stopping the load.

The boys and Walter took the accident calmly, hitched their other tractor to the one mired in the manure and pulled it out. After a few repairs at a local machine shop it was ready for work again today. Incidentally, the lucky tractor is the one Mr. Lehman purchased at the Edwin Beer sale some months ago, when many bidders offered the ceiling price and Lehman was lucky on the drawing.
