Clark is modest in his announcement to his mother, who kindly consented to the use of the interesting letter for publication. Dated April 5, it follows:

Have been thinking of you constantly and am happy for your faith in my coming home. It is consoling and who knows, maybe prophetic?

I hope you didn't worry too much about that notice from the War Department or whatever department it was. Their officialdom and dignity causes them to dish out their dope in the literal and if a leg is blown off or merely punctured it's all one to them. Actually it was more of a miss than a hit
