Ayres and wife have had nine children, two of whom, Edna and Basil, are deceased, the others being James E., Blanche, Hazel, Edgar E., Paul, Marguerite and Leroy, all of whom are married save Blanche. James E. Ayres married Minnie Bradley, who was born in Canada. Hazel Ayres married Homer W. McDaniel. Edgar Ayres married Ada St Claire of Delaware County. Marguerite Ayres married Gordon E. Bradley, of Canada, and Leroy Ayres married Minnie Minsch.

In 1915, Paul R. Ayres was united in marriage to Opal E. Hunt, who was born in Adams County, this state, and to this union two children have been born, Robert Dale and Frances Marcelle.

Mr. and Mrs. Ayres are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church and are Republicans. Mr. Ayres is a Royal Arch Mason and an Encampment Odd Fellow at Dunkirk and a member of the local lodge of the Knights of Pythias at Redkey.
