For more than a quarter of a century he was seriously afflicted with rheumatism and lameness of his lower limbs, which eventually made him helpless. This coupled with his

dullness of hearing practically shut him in from the world from every point of view.

He was bereft of his wife January 17, 1902, and started out to fight the remaining days

In November, 1886, he became a member of the Christian church in Salamonia, under the ministrations of Elder G. W. Hill, of Bowling Green, Ohio, and continued his faithful

connection with that congregation until called to his eternal reward.

He was a man of deep and abiding convictions, scrupulously honest, and with an ultra abhorrence for sham or pretense. He loved his friends passionately and never betrayed confidence.

About 7 p.m. March 28, he laid the armor down and crossed the Jordan of death at the ripe age of 95 years, 2 months and 4 days. He leaves to mourn, one son, two daughters,

24 grandchildren and 55 great grandchildren, and many friends and loved ones.
