
Celebrated Their Golden Wedding.

Not that Mr. and Mrs. McLain had forgotten that it was their 50th wedding anniversary, but their children had long planned and then most successfully carried out the surprise in celebration of the event.

Mr. and Mrs. Samuel C. Whitford arrived from Indianapolis on Thursday and these were all of the children whom the parents expected to have home with them for the day. Friday morning at about 10 o'clock while Mrs. McLain was busy in her kitchen preparing a specially good dinner and Mr. McLain was busy too at the store, all of their children came in home, and while Mrs. McLain was detained in her kitchen, the children crept into the house and gathered in the front room. Then a messenger was sent to tell Mr. McLain to "come quick, the stove pipe has fallen down," and hatless he hurried home. The surprise was complete on both Mr. and Mrs. McLain.

To this union were born 9 children, four of whom have passed beyond; two died in infancy; Mary E died April 5, 1914 and Charles A on June 16, 1917. They have four grandchildren. Although Mr. and Mrs. McLain have seen 50 years of happy married life, they are still both in their youth, Mr. McLain being only 68 and Mrs. McLain 67 years young. These children made their parents happy indeed in the celebration of this rare event. Each of them present the parents with five dollars in gold as gifts of the occasion.
