For several days, Marshal Ensminger has been engaged in following up a clew (sic) looking to the discovery and arrest of the burglars who have been operating in this city with torch "jimmy" and revolvers. About one o'clock this morning he arrested and locked up three students of the Preparatory department of Wabash College, respectively: Wallace F. Throckmorton, of Romney; Willie Pflahler, of Greencastle; and John Green of Waynetown. They virtually confessed to burglarizing and setting fire to Tinsley & Martin's Hardware but Green claimed the man who put up the job was named Charles May, a stranger, and that he disappeared after the Tinsley & Martin Fire. The revolvers taken were disposed of by Green and traced (?) out by Marshal Ensminger. They also confessed to making an attempt on Brewer's book store and to the attempt at burning South Hall at Wabash College. They will have a preliminary examination this afternoon. It is said that Pffahler has a bad reputation and could not gain admission to any of the Greencastle schools. The reputation of the other fellows is not bad. Startling developments may be expected, implicating other parties. The business interests will feel relieved at this arrest. - kbz
