Mrs. Smoker was thrown out of the auto by the impact. Smoker and Long and Long's companion, Miss Mayme Wogoman, 25, of Syracuse, suffered minor injuries and were taken to the Goshen hospital.

Smoker is founder and president of the Smoker Lumber company at New Paris. Surviving besides the husband are four sons, Ralph, Max, Mark and Chester Smoker, and two daughters, Mrs. Frank Roscoe, and Mrs. Everett Miller, all of New Paris; one brother, Noble Stutsman of Nampa, Ida.; her stepmother, Mrs. Mary Murray, and one step-sister, Mrs. Frank Kampler, both of North Manchester.
