


The Family of John Guffy and Margaret (Hixon) Puntenney





John Guffy Puntenny was the son of Aquilla and Elinor (Headley) Puntenney. Aquilla and Elinor settled in Wabash Township, Parke County, Indiana in 1818. Below is a certified copy of one of three Land Grants Aquilla Puntenney obtained in 1835 during the Andrew Jackson administration for his service in the war of 1812.

Obituary JOHN PUNTENNEY

Pioneer Settler of Wabash Township Passes Away At Ripe Old Age

Born and Raised Within Two Hundred Yards of Where He Passed Away


John Puntenney died Friday evening at the age of eighty-two years and one month, after a long and useful career. His parents settled the land, or a portion of it in 1818, and it had been in the family ever since. Thirty years ago Mr Puntenney erected the house where he pass ed away and had resided there continuously. He leaves to mourn his loss, a widow and two daughters, Mrs. Virgil Marshall and Mrs. B. O. Cook. Four years ago he divided up his land 350 acres giving it to his daughters retaining the homestead and a small portion for his own use He was a man well liked by his neighbors and was always ready to help those in distress. The community loses a staunch friend and adviser.

At an early age he joined the Montezuma Lodge 89 F. & A. M and up to a few years ago was one of their most active members At the time of his death he was the oldest living member of this lodge. At his request, the lodge performed the last sad rites a the grave, paying him that tribute of respect given to all mem bers. There were about thirty of his brother masons at the funeral, services were held from the family residence Sunday afternoon at two o'cleck safte laid to rest.

Much could be said of his life as one of the pioneers of Wabash township, which he had seen advance, step by step, to its present efficiency. He was a firm advocate of good roads and waalways willing to do all in hipower for any public improve-


Brockway Cabin.



The Brockway Cabin was located in Wabash Township in Parke County Indiana just south of the confluence of Racoon Creek and the Wabash River. In the early 1900's the cabin was the site of community gatherings such as the one shown here.

The cabin was built by a local resident named Brockway with the help of Anton Hulman from Terre Haute, Indiana. Mr. Brockway lived in the community full-time while Mr. Hulman had a summer home not far from this site.
