The men in the store did all in their power for the relief of the woman, but death resulted in less than half an hour from the moment she appealed for help.

Mr. and Mrs. Albright came to Canton this morning to do some trading and were at Mr. Kavern's place, finishing their shopping preparatory to starting for home. As it was past the noon hour, Mrs. Albright was making a lunch of bananas.

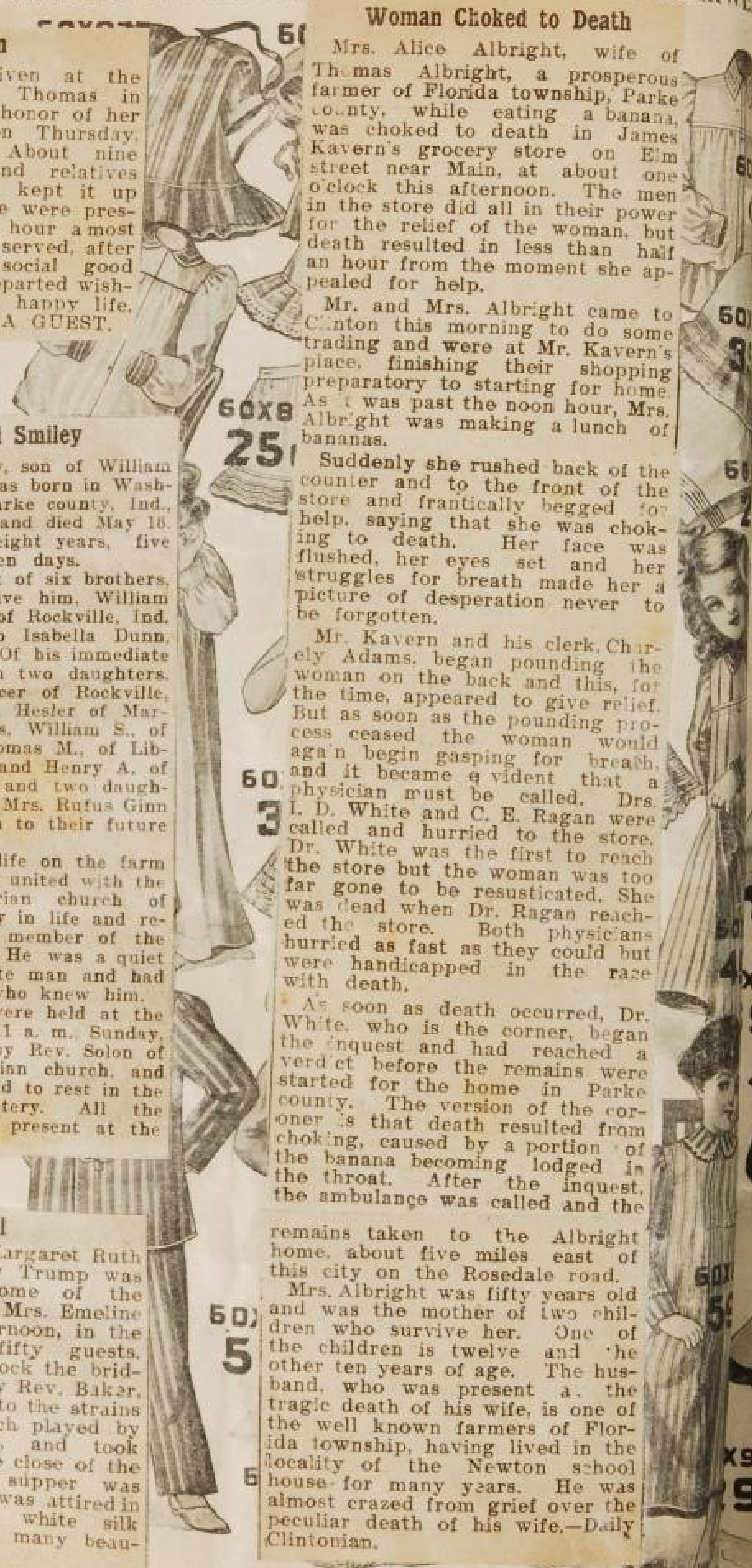
Suddenly she rushed back of the counter and to the front of the store and frantically begged for help, saying that she was choking to death. Her face was flushed, her eyes set and her struggles for breath made her a picture of desperation never to be forgotten.

Mr. Kavern and his clerk, Charley Adams, began pounding the woman on the back and this, for the time, appeared to give relief. But as soon as the pounding process ceased the woman would again begin gasping for breath, and it became evident that a physician must be called. Drs. I. D. White and C. E. Ragan were called and hurried to the store. Dr. White was the first to reach the store but the woman was too far gone to be resuscitated. She was dead when Dr. Ragan reached the store. Both physicians hurried as fast as they could but were handicapped in the race with death.

As soon as death occurred, Dr. White, who is the corner, began the inquest and had reached a verdict before the remains were started for the home in Parke county. The version of the coroner is that death resulted from choking, caused by a portion of the banana becoming lodged in the throat. After the inquest, the ambulance was called and the

remains taken to the Albright home, about five miles east of this city on the Rosedale road.

Mrs. Albright was fifty years old and was the mother of two children who survive her. One of the children is twelve and the other ten years of age. The husband, who was present at the tragic death of his wife, is one of the well known farmers of Florida township, having lived in the locality of the Newton school house for many years. He was almost crazed from grief over the peculiar death of his wife.—Daily Clintonian.

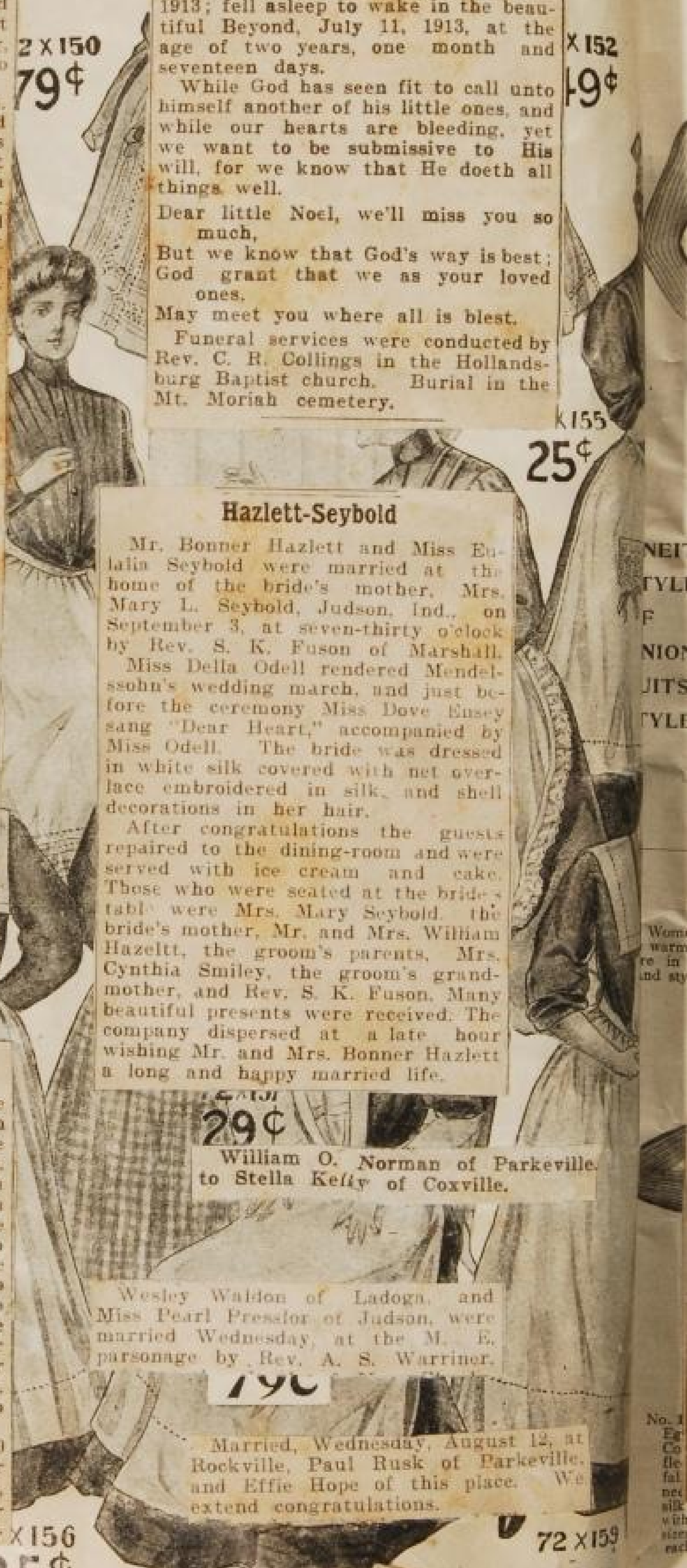

The community was greatly shocked on Monday to learn of the death of one of the most widely known citizens of Greene township, Moses R. Burks, at the Methodist hospital in Indianapolis, at 2:30 in the afternoon. Mr. Burks was in Rockville, about three weeks ago, and seemed to be in excellent spirits. He was going to return to the hospital, where he had been for some months, and expected to come home soon to stay. Mrs. Burks was with him until last Thursday when he seemed so well she came home for a few days. On Monday morning, Col. J. R. Burks received a message that his father was in a critical condition. He with Mrs. Burks left at one for Indianapolis, but Mr. Burks had passed away before they reached Indianapolis. 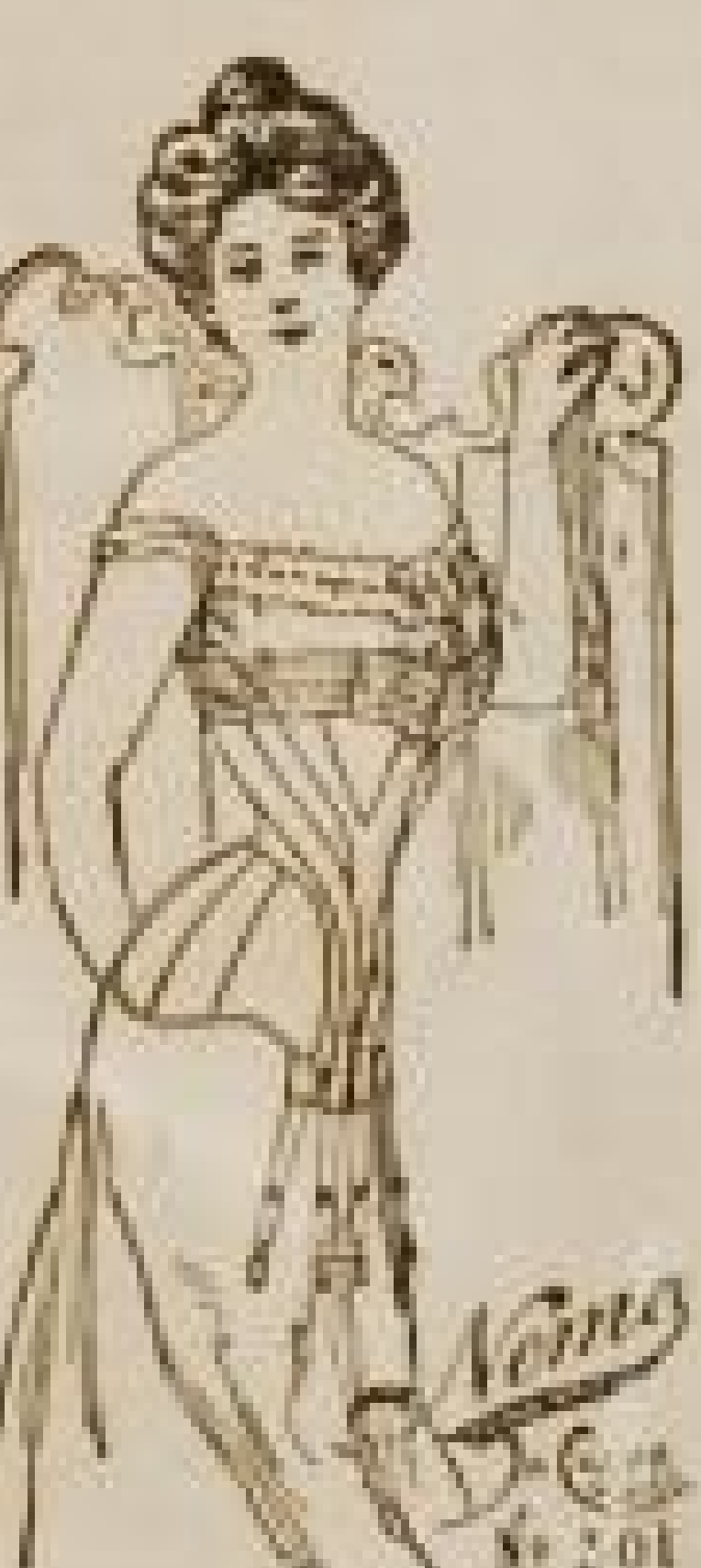

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Ladoga, June 2.—Elsworth Gowin, 47 years old, a painter, who resides in Crawfordsville, at the corner of Milligan street and Russell avenue, was found dead here this morning about half-past five by Henry Ragsdel. The man was lying in front of the Methodist church, between it and the sidewalk. Mr. Ragsdel reported to others that he had found a dead man and word was sent to Dr. M. B. Williams, county coroner, at Mace, and he arrived here about half-past seven and held an inquest. After hearing the evidence he stated that Gowin had come to his death by suicide, having taken carbolic acid. It is the opinion of the coroner that the victim had been dead only about an hour when discovered by Mr. Ragsdel.

The suicide left a note to his wife which said in substance that he was in financial trouble and that he had tried to leave, but rather than desert his family in that manner death was preferable. The note also asked that George Gowin, a brother, of near Carpentersville, be sent for. Mr. Gowin had told friends a few days ago that he was in hard luck and that he had been unable to get much work since moving to Crawfordsville about the first of March this year. His financial trouble weighed heavily on his mind, it is thought, and worry over it is perhaps what drove him to take the poison. It came out in the evidence that he had purchased the acid at Roachdale on Tuesday. A two ounce vial which had contained the poison was found by Ephraim Mercer twenty-five feet away from the man's body and was later turned over to the coroner.

Gowin and his son, who is about nineteen years old, were seen together on the streets here about half-past eleven last night. Testimony given at the inquest revealed that Mr. Gowin and his son parted at the Methodist church and that the father told his son he was coming to Crawfordsville. Instead of doing so it appears that the victim remained at or near the church the most of the after part of the night until he took the acid. It also came out at the inquest that the dead man had had trouble with his wife, and that he had threatened recently to kill her. After this trouble, which occurred at their home in Crawfordsville, Mrs. Gowin and her three children came to Ladoga and have since been staying at the home of Mrs. McVey, mother of Mrs. Gowin.

After the inquest was concluded the body was turned over to R. W. Wade, funeral director here, who will prepare it for burial. It was stated that the interment would probably be at Roachdale. The suicide lived three miles southwest of here three or four years ago and was then a farmer. From that farm he moved to a farm near Rockville and resided there until he located in Crawfordsville about the first of March this year. When found this morning by Mr. Ragsdel he was well dressed, as he wore a good suit of clothes, a clean collar, and there was evidence that he had recently visited the barber shop.
