Waveland, Dec. 1.-Rlelhith Moore, age 85 , it reteran of the Confederate army of the civil war and at long time restdent of Mont gomery cuturty, diled sudtumly a hils home near The Shades Thurs day morning at 6:30 o'clock whes he suffered a atroke of apoplexs

Mr. Moore came to Indiana from Virginia with hls family shortly after the close of the war in 18 s and settied in this community. He had lived here ever pince. He onBaged in farming practically al his life, He also operated a saw
mill and for many years was an Bociated with The Shedes.

During the years of 1895 1896 Mr. Moota was mathager of this famous naturnl park and since that time he has been connected With the park in varfotn capacttleat He was exceptlonally well linown and hiked in thly community.
Mr, Moore was born in Lexing ton, Va., on April 9, 1847. His boy, hood was passed in that state. He enlisted in the Contederate army on March 10, 1862, when he was but fourteen years of age. He en-
