Mary, daughter of John and Elizabeth Carmichael, was born on a farm near Bellmore, Ind., Feb. 9, 1839. She departed this life at the home of her daughter, Carrie, near Judson, Oct. 26, 1921, age 82 years, 8 months and 17 days.

She was one of a family of six children, four brothers and two sisters, all of whom except Samuel Carmichael of Sanger, Cal., have preceded her.

Oct. 16, 1859, she was united in marriage with William P. Stout and went to the community of Hollandsburg where for more than 59 years, or till the death of her husband, April 14, 1918, she resided. Seven children came to bless this home, three of them dying in infancy and one son, Charlie, at the age of 24. After the death of her husband she made her home with her daughters.

She leaves to mourn her departure, one son, William Elmer, of Chicago, two daughters, Mrs. Charles Strange of New Discovery neighborhood and Mrs. Howard B. Clark of Judson; two grandchildren, Eula Mae Strange and Margaret Stout, and many other relatives and friends. Their earthly loss is her eternal gain.

January 31, 1863, she united with the Baptist church at Hollandsburg of which she was a valued and consistent member. She was one of the oldest members of this organization.

Aunt Mary was essentially a home woman, in the most expanded sense of this term, and found her greatest pleasure in her home surrounded by family, neighbors and friends, and so far as her strength would permit, did everything possible to make that home life beautiful, pure and refined. Her love, motherly sympathy and devotion to her home and friends is beautifully reflected by their unstinted care and loving self-sacrifice for her during her declining years. In the life of this good christian mother we have a beautiful example of devotion, sympathy and love for family, church, home and community. She is not dead, she has only gone before.

"Whose love can equal the love of the mother?

Whose the devotion so loyal and true? Who suffers so much with such joy for another,

who works with such pleasure as mother for you?

You hail with delight the friendship of others,

You revel in love of the sweetheart you've won,

Yet where do you find a friendship like mother's,

Unbroken till death calls and life's work is done?"

Funeral services were held at the Union Baptist church of Hollandsburg Friday morning, at 10:30, Rev. S. K. Fuson of Rockville officiating. The body was laid to rest by the side of that of her husband in Mount Moriah cemetery.

Mr. McGaughey is a prosperous farmer, and attended Wabash College two years. Mrs. McGaughey attended the schools of the county and two years at Purdue University.

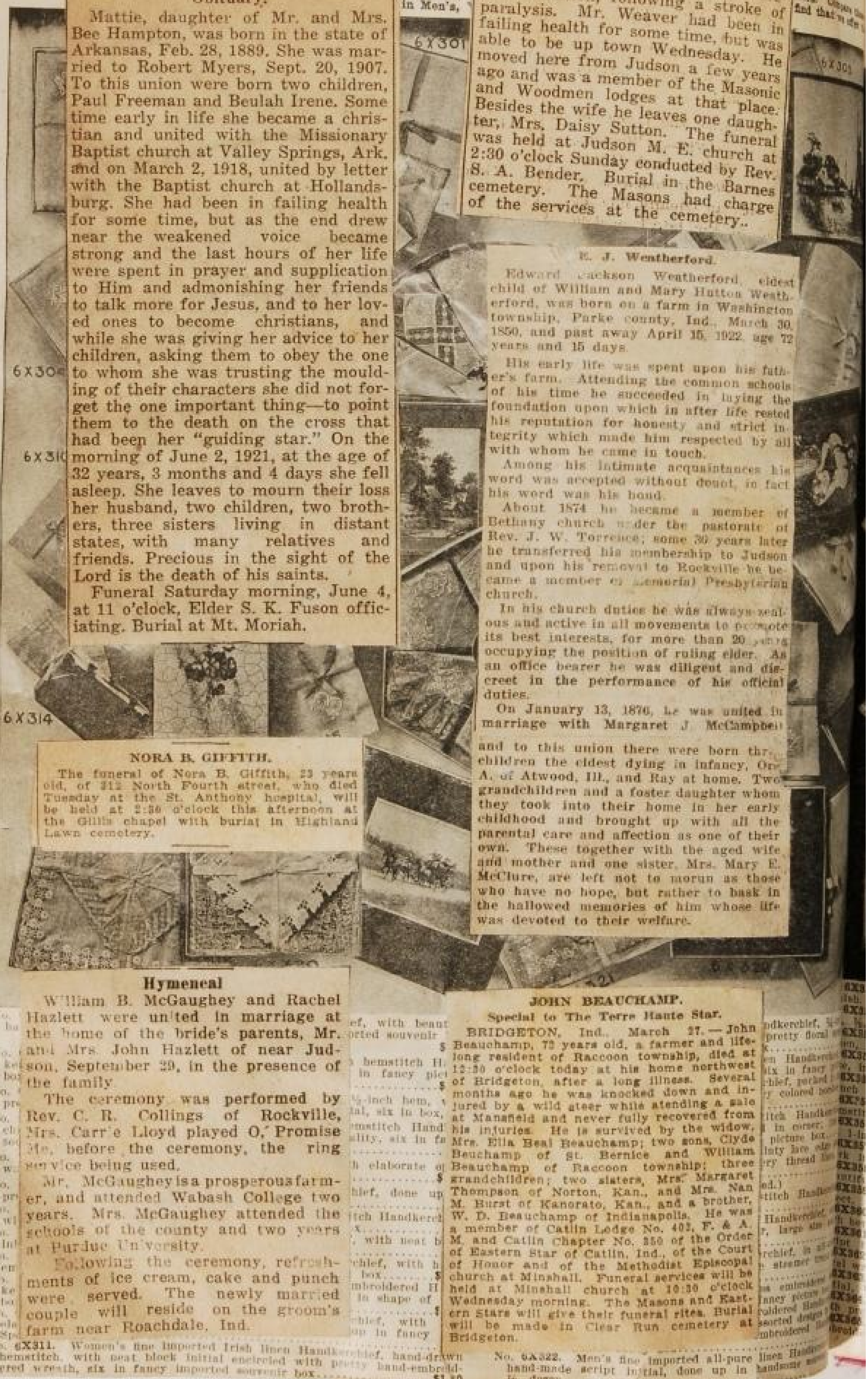
Following the ceremony, refreshments of ice cream, cake and punch were served. The newly married couple will reside on the groom's farm near Roachdale, Ind.

He was united in marriage to Sarah Wright, Sept. 2, 1860. To this union were born seven children—Mrs. Laura McClain, Mrs. Allen Blake, Mrs. Clara Ball, Mrs. Rhoda Jeffries, John and Lawrence Stout, all living near their father's. The mother and one son Jerry preceded him in death.

He was again united in marriage to Melissa Bullington. Two children came to bless this union—Parke and Ida and again death visited the home and claimed for his own the wife and daughter.

After living some time in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Ball, he was united in marriage to Mrs. Nora Biddle. One daughter Ruth was born to this union. Three grandchildren, Bert McClain, Edith Blake and an infant and four great grandchildren have gone on before.

Mr. Stout was of a family of seven children. One sister, Mrs. Rebecca Rush of Los Angeles, Cal., survives him. His entire life was spent on the farm where he died. While Mr. Stout was interested in all lines of church work his greatest enjoyment was when he was singing the praises of his Master. Former Parke County Business Man. Resided in Terre Haute—Active to the Last—Life Sketch

George William second child of George Alexander and Mary Helen McMurtry, was born on the farm one mile west of Judson on Jan. 22, 1855, and passed away at his home in Terre Haute on Friday mornin. May 8, 1925, at the age of 70 years, 3 months and 16 days.

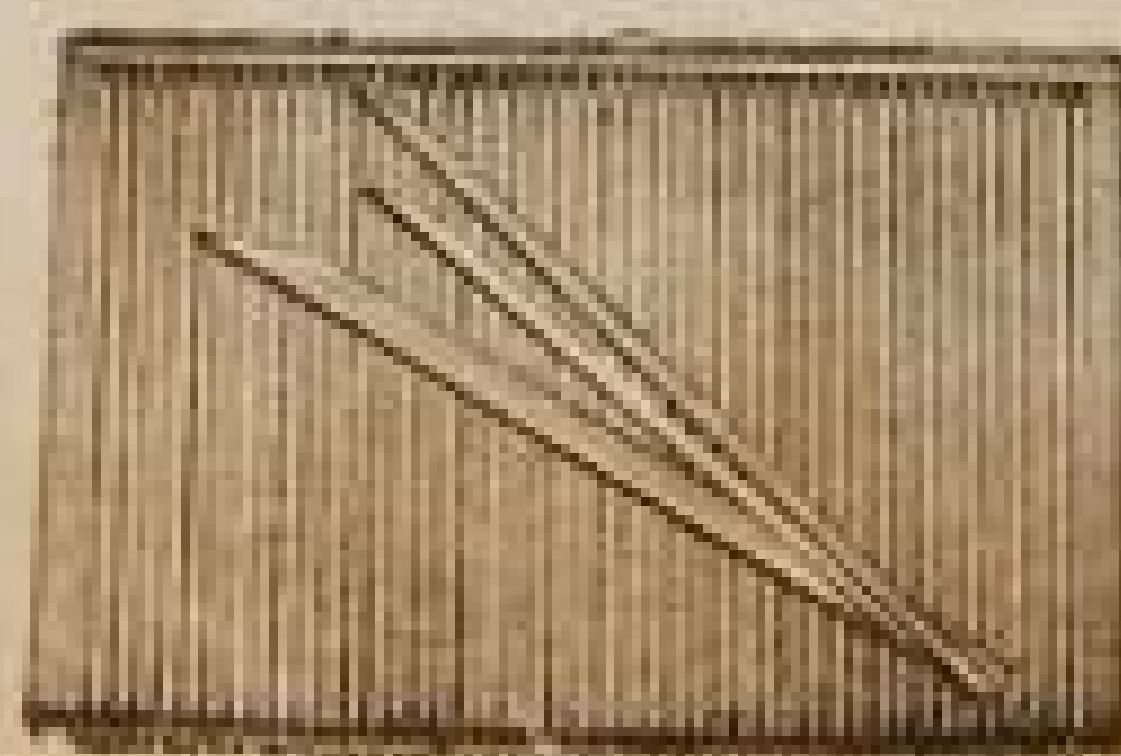

**MRS. JOHN H. SPENCER

RICHARD L. MOORE, OLD CONFEDERATE SOLDIER, DIES SUDDENLY

Waveland, Dec. 1.—Richard L. Moore, age 85, a veteran of the Confederate army of the civil war and a long time resident of Montgomery county, died suddenly at his home near The Shades Thursday morning at 6:30 o'clock when he suffered a stroke of apoplexy.

Mr. Moore came to Indiana from Virginia with his family shortly after the close of the war in 1865 and settled in this community. He had lived here ever since. He engaged in farming practically all his life. He also operated a saw mill and for many years was associated with The Shades.

During the years of 1895 and 1896 Mr. Moore was manager of this famous natural park and since that time he has been connected with the park in various capacities. He was exceptionally well known and liked in this community.

Mr. Moore was born in Lexington, Va., on April 9, 1847. His boyhood was passed in that state. He enlisted in the Confederate army on March 10, 1862, when he was but fourteen years of age. He enlisted as a private in Company C, 1st Virginia cavalry and was with Gen. Robert E. Lee when that famous Confederate leader surrendered to Gen. U. S. Grant at Appomatox Court House, Va., on April 9, 1865, which incidentally was Mr. Moore's eighteenth birthday.

Survivors are one daughter, Mrs. Fred Underwood of Indianapolis, and one step-son, Dr. B. N. Harbison of Waveland. His wife, who was the former Miss Harriet A. Clark, and to whom he was united in marriage on Oct. 25, 1883, preceded him in death last June.

For the past month Robert Williams has been living with Mr. Moore at his farm home and was with him when he suffered the fatal heart attack. Mr. Moore appeared to be enjoying his usual health up until the time he was stricken and only recently had visited his daughter in Indianapolis.

Funeral services will be conducted Friday afternoon at two o'clock at the Waveland Methodist church and will be in charge of Rev. Victor Keiser, pastor of the church, assisted by Rev. H. R. Sigler, pastor of the Presbyterian church here.

Members of the Masonic lodge of which Mr. Moore was a member, also will take part in the services. The body will lay in state in the church from 1 to 2 o'clock Friday afternoon. Interment will take place in the Maple Ridge cemetery here. The remains are now at the Machledt funeral home.

Mrs. H. L. Britton.

Mary Frances Thompson Britton, daughter of Richard K. and Mary Payton Thompson, was born in the Pleasant Valley neighborhood near Bridgeton, October 22, 1861, and died at her home in Judson, July 24, 1931, age 69 years, 9 months and 2 days.

After the death of her mother, which occurred when Mary was about 2 years old, the father moved his family to the vicinity of Bellmore, where Mary grew to young womanhood.

Her childhood and youth was not very different from that of other girls of her time, it was not all work neither was it all play but work and play so alternating as to produce the sterling qualities of womanhood that endeared Mrs. Britton to all who knew her. Her education was gained by attending the public schools of the community. She was a pupil of two schools, one at Bellmore, the other at Swaim's cross roads. In school she was earnest, painstaking, and thoro. She believed that what was worth doing was worth doing well and gave to each school task her best effort. She loved to read and was familiar with much of our best literature. She possessed an extremely retentive memory, many of the poems, speeches and extracts of literary art learned in childhood she could readily recall and repeat perfectly in later life.

Early in life she confessed Christ and united with the Methodist church of Bellmore. She gave to the church of her choice a lifetime of consecrated devotion; she believed in its tenets and was constant in action leading to the betterment and upbuilding of the church and its auxiliaries.

Beside her church affiliations she was a charter member of two social institutions, the Ladies Social Union of Judson and the Order of Eastern Star of the same place.

September 11, 1879, she was united in marriage to Henry L. Britton. One child, a daughter, came to bless this union.

After the death of her daughter Carrie, which occurred March 23, 1924, Mrs. Britton took into her home and heart the daughter's infant son, Joe Adams. She gave to this young grandson the same measure of affection and care she had given to his mother during her childhood and youth. Every moment of her time and every ounce of her waning strength was used for little Joe's welfare and happiness.

Of her father's family, only one, a brother, Jesse Thompson of Bellmore, survives, two sisters, Sarah and Anna, and two brothers, James and Thomas, having preceded her in death. Those left to mourn her passing are her husband, her grandson Joe, her brother, Jesse, many nieces and nephews and many other relatives, friends and neighbors.

Mary Frances Britton was a true wife and mother, a kind considerate friend and neighbor. A woman who detested cant or sham, she was firm in her convictions of what was right and proper yet her firmness of purpose never amounted to arrogance or haughtiness.

Chaste and pure herself she saw only the good in others. She was free from gossip and was always ready with a word of cheer or comfort where she thought it would be appreciated.

She was always ready and willing to assist in the accomplishment of any good or worthy thing, yet her retiring disposition prevented her from pushing herself to the fore.

Being a woman of fine sensibilities, truth and righteousness became an integral part of her nature. We do not believe Mrs. Britton ever knowingly did a mean or unkind act.

She died as she had lived a pure, sweet, womanly woman.

We who mourn do not do so as those who have no hope, but we rest securely upon the same divine promises that sustained Mrs. Britton thru-out life.
