Unconscious 114 Hours After Knockout by George Scott, Kokomo Pugilist

Following 114 hours of unconsciousness, Wilbur Russell, 29, 1043 South Bell street, an amateur boxer, died at four o'clock Monday afternoon at the Good Samaritan hospital from a blow struck in a boxing contest at the Sipe theater last Wednesday night. As a result of the accidental death, George Scott, his opponent, will probably be held for an investigation by the Howard county grand jury.

The two men were matched in a three round bout in the light heavy-weight division of an amateur tournament. The bout started just before ten o'clock in the evening.

In the first round, Scott appeared to be decidedly the better boxer and Russell took heavy punishment from his hard hitting opponent. Just before the gong rang at the close of the three minute first round, Wilbur was knocked to the canvas. As the bell rang he rose and walked to his corner where he received the ministrations of his seconds.

Referee Stops Fight.

At the start of the second round he rose and walked out to meet his opponent. Suddenly his hands dropped to his sides and he straightened up in an unusual attitude. Seeing that he was in distress Referee John Krebsler, seized Scott's arm, and stopped the fight, awarding Scott the decision on a technical knockout.

Just at that moment Russell collapsed and fell to the canvas in the ring. A doctor was at the ringside and gave the fallen man immediate attention. After working with him for some time, the doctor ordered him taken to the hospital.

He was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital where specialists were called and every effort was made to restore Russell to consciousness, all of which were unsuccessful. The case was diagnosed as "edema of the brain," or a blood clot on the left side of the skull causing a paralysis of the right side.

Following the death Monday Coroner Elton R. Clarke performed an autopsy and found the diagnosis had been correct. There was a large blood clot on the left side of the brain which had followed a hemorrhage. The resultant pressure on the brain had caused the paralysis and ultimately death, according to the coroner. Coroner Clarke also announced that the skull was unusually thin on the side above the blood clot although otherwise the skull was thick.

Prosecutor Glen R. Hillis was summoned and began an investigation. He said that from the details he had at the time, it appeared to him that the death was caused by an unfortunate accident which could not have been foreseen. However he said, a complete investigation would be made for the sake of all persons concerned, and that it was possible that Scott might be called to appear before a Howard county grand jury. This action, it was reported would be a technical procedure which would clear all official legal questions in regard to the death of Russell. Decision on calling the grand jury will be announced Tuesday following a conference between Prosecutor Hillis, Coroner Clarke and Judge Joseph Cripe, of Howard circuit court.

Russell is survived by his widow, Mrs. Trilby Russell, three brothers, Curtis, Leroy and Robert, five sisters, Elizabeth, Lily, Luvene, Edith and Gertrude, and two twin children, Wilma and Wilbur, who are living with a former wife in Lancaster, Ohio.

The funeral arrangements have not been completed.

George Scott who lives in the country near Sycamore could not be reached Monday night.

Mysterious Death of Thorne Randolph.

"Accidental death by poisoning" is the final report reached in all investigations regarding the sudden death a few days since of Thorne Fitz Randolph, who was born near Rockville 30 years ago, the only child of Roy and Golda Thorne Randolph, now of Danville, Ind.

While located at Danville Thorne graduated from C. N. C. and was an active member of the M. E. church. He was a widely known chemist of high repute and had been affiliated with the Indiana School of Pharmacy as professor of chemistry for five years. Just recently he had completed his work for his A. M. degree at the University of Wisconsin where, according to word received from that institution he was held in highest esteem, and, his degree will be awarded.

WOMAN DIES IN TRAFFIC MISHAP

Rockville, Oct. 16—Miss Nora McClain, age about 60, was killed instantly Monday morning shortly before 7 o'clock when she stepped into the side of an automobile in front of her home at Hollandsburg, east of here on U. S. highway 36.

The automobile into which the woman walked was driven by Clarence Michaels, of near Bellmore. He was not held by investigating officers.

Michaels was driving east at the time of the accident. There was a truck going east in front of him and it was believed Miss McClain waited for the truck to pass but did not see the approaching automobile.

She walked against the right side of the car, a door handle striking her in the head. Her skull was crushed and her arms and legs broken.

The only immediate survivor is a sister, Rena, with whom she lived.

Dr. B. H. Branson, Parke county coroner, investigated the mishap.

Miss McClain was born near Hollandsburg, the daughter of Jess and Mary McClain. A brother, J. B. (Bucky) McClain, died Aug. 8, following which she and her sister sold the farm on which they lived and moved to Hollandsburg.

Funeral services will be held at the Mt. Moriah church north of here Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock, with Rev. C. L. Airhart in charge. The body will lie in state for an hour preceding the services. Burial will be in the church cemetery.
