He attended school in an old log building built in the midst of a deep, gloomy woods on his father's farm. He lived the life of an early pioneer, working in the fields of his father with rude wooden implements, and enjoying the free country life of beautiful sights and sound. From early youth he took a keen, active interest in world affairs and kept this interest until the day of his death. He was well read and could discuss almost any subject with clarity and understanding.

On Oct. 6, 1880, he married Nancy Alice Peyton. To this union, four children were born: Claude Jarvis, now residing in Crawfordsville; Mrs. Lola Lee Fletcher of Darlington; Mrs. Ethel Maude Deere and Mrs. Mary Dott Esterbrook, of Terre Haute. Four grandchildren, Mrs. Juanita Graham, Mrs. Gladise Randolph, Kenneth Fletcher and Mrs. Mary Florence Larrick; three great grandchildren, Richard Randolph, Robert Larrick and Rebecca Larrick, had the joy and privilege of growing up in an environment of high idealism, patient understanding and kindly sympathy expressed by this man.

His first wife passed on March 23, 1907. On Nov. 24, 1909, he married Sarah Catherine Ford of Indianapolis and they have enjoyed many happy years together.

All of his life, he lived on the same farm, and for many years he was an active farmer, raising black cattle and other livestock, as well as much grain. He loved his home above all else and never was satisfied very long at a time when he was away from it. He was an affectionate husband, a loving father, a kind, sympathetic grandfather and a good neighbor. He was courteous and hospitable, always thinking of the happiness and welfare of others.

Although he had been in failing health about one year, he had been bedfast only one month. On a beautiful summer morning, he quietly slipped away from us, leaving us an example of a life well spent.

## Rites for Mrs. R. V. Saylor at Local Church, Wednesday

Due to arthritis, Mrs. Saylor had been a semi-invalid for about 20 years. Since her husband entered the service of the American Red Cross last June, she had resided at the home of a cousin, Mrs. Carrie Hudson in Brazil.

Born in Parke county, Jan. 23, 1892, Mrs. Saylor was the daughter of Daniel and Maria Miller. She was married to Rev. Saylor, May 9, 1917. Much of their married life was spent in Florida and Arkansas. Due to Mrs. Saylor's health they returned to Parke county in 1932 and resided south of Bellmore for some time. They later lived in the Christian parsonage here. Rev. Saylor was pastor of the local church about eight years. He is now a Red Cross field director at Ft. Benjamin Harrison.

Mrs. Saylor was a member of the Christian church. She was held in high esteem by all who knew her. The husband is the only immediate survivor. The body was brought to the Montgomery funeral home here and funeral services were held at the Christian church at 2 o'clock, Wednesday afternoon, Rev. Claude C.
