The desire to commence the work had lain dormant for a long time, but once under way, it became an important part of my life. One thing led to another; in rapid succession the quest jumped from Adel, Iowa, to Ladoga, Indiana; from Ladoga to Mt. Sterling, Kentucky - then on to Fairfax and Gloucester Counties, Virginia - - the Civil War, the War of 1812 and the War of the American Revolution, the U. S. National Archives, libraries, personal interviews, Federal Censuses, state and county tax lists, deeds, wills, court suits, land grants, pension and marriage records - - nearly two thousand letters, thousands of miles, torn clothing fighting through thorn thickets to reach forgotten burial grounds.....

It is not easy to say what constitutes the greatest fascination of an attempt to glimpse the past. It is partly curiosity and family pride, but that is not the entire answer. While there is a tremendous challenge in the search itself, above all it must be the discovery of a tiny opening of the door to a world which is known deep in the subconseious, but becomes apparent only in brief intuitive flashes. Perhaps we all need more moments of deep philosophical insight. If the study of the lives of our ancestors and the environments in which they lived provides some of these moments, it becomes worthwhile for that reason alone. When this is combined with a partial satisfaction of man's insatiable desire to know where he has been and where he is going, such research returns a many-faceted reward.

Space does not allow me to name the hundred or more people who have , cooperated in the gathering of these data. I must pay special tribute to three professional genealogists, without whose help the search would have died aborning: Mrs. Miriam Stockwell of Alexandria, Virginia, and Mr. Charles H. Hamlin of Richmond, Virginia, for their research in the records of Fairfax and Gloucester Counties of that state. Mrs. Hazel M. Boyd, of Mt. Sterling, Kentucky, did incomparable work in solving the most frustrating problem of all - the positive link between Willis and William Clark; I cannot praise her enough.

The few early records extant for Gloucester County, Virginia, have yet to furnish evidence to establish the parentage of Richard Clarke. This may be the end of the trail. It seems probable that our Clark forebears came to this country from England in the middle to late 1600's, but this is only speculation. I continue to search (futilely, it seems), but perhaps the riddle may yet be solved. I invite correspondence from interested parties, and will welcome corrections for the inevitable errors which occur in such a record as this. I trust these errors are minor - I am positive that the major relationships outlined herein are correct.

There is no evidence that any in our Clark line have been nationally famous people - ship-builders, traders, civilian soldiers, mostly tillers of the soil-I salute them, and to them I dedicate this brief work and my continuing quest for knowledge of their lives. With new data and fresh energy, perhaps someday I can present a truly professional record. This is not such a work, but I make no further apologies - I feel pride in it, and I am glad that I have done it; it has enriched my life more than I can tell - - - - - - JWC

Richard Clarke

ichard Clarke was probably born in Gloucester County, Virginia, although definite proof is lacking. He may be placed in that area as early as 1755, as his marriage to Elizabeth Bohannon is recorded in the Kingston Parish register on the 17th of February of that year. His date of birth is not known, but is estimated to have been circa 1732. He probably died in February or March of 1811, as his will was probated 18 March 1811, in Fairfax County, Virginia. Several years of study of various Clark records from Fairfax County, and the fragmentary records extant for Gloucester County, suggest that the father of Richard Clarke could have been a John Clarke, and that Richard may also have had a brother named John. This is only a hint, with not one shred of proof.

The same Kingston Parish register also records the dates of birth and baptism of his two eldest sons, Thomas and Joseph. Inasmuch as these birth dates check with the dates given in the applications for pension for Revolutionary service by these sons, the connection is certain.

Thomas, Joseph, and a third son, William, all moved to the present areas of Fayette and Montgomery Counties, Kentucky, in the approximate interval between 1785 and 1795. Various Kentucky documents positively relate them to one another.

Richard Clarke appears to have been a ship owner, and probably a ship builder. The pension application of his son, Thomas, states that he was an apprentice ship's carpenter in Gloucester County in 1775. Indentures dated 15 Nov 1785 between Richard Clarke, "Water man", and Michael Thorn, cover the sale to Thorn of a sloop, the Industry, and a schooner, the William, and various items of furniture. Further, a newspaper item of 1784 refers to an Auditor's certificate "...in the name of Richard Clark, for fifty-seven pounds, some shillings, due him for his services in moving public tobacco in time of war..." Other Public Service claims are found in his name which establish him as a proven patriot by reason of supplies furnished to the Continental Army.

The early study of Richard Clarke, based on the first few records found, suggested that he had moved from Gloucester to Fairfax County in the year 1777. This was based on a statement found in the pension application of his son Joseph, in which Joseph states that after his first period of service, he "...returned home to Fairfax County in the fall of 1777, his parents having moved to that county..." Records found subsequently indicate that this statement of Joseph had been misinterpreted, and that Richard had possibly moved to Fairfax County at least as early as 1769, for in that year we find that he was the defendant in a trespass case filed in Fairfax County on the 20th of November. If Richard had not officially moved to Fairfax County by 1769, he at least had extensive business in the area from that year on.

Apparently Richard's first wife, Elizabeth, died prior to 1783, for in that year his wife is named as Sarah in a deed in which he conveyed town lots in Alexandria. It seems likely that Sarah also died, in about 1785, and her death may have influenced Richard's presumed abandonment of the shipping business and his move to the then remote southwestern part of Fairfax County near Wolf Run. This is inferred from the indenture of 1785 (referred to above), in which, in addition to the two ships, he conveys title to three featherbeds, and a number of tables and chairs and other furnishings. Such a sale would seem compatible with the actions of a man who was a widower at the time. Also, when he sold other lands in Alexandria in 1785, the deed did not mention a wife.

Richard married a third time, Jane ____, who is named in his will. While proof is lacking, she was possibly Jane Ford, the widow of Thomas Ford, who died in 1776, and who had owned land adjoining Richard's Wolf Run property. Thomas Clarke, son of Richard, also married a Jane Ford, who may have been a daughter of this family, although she is not named in Thomas Ford's will, which was written in 1774. Edward Ford, a son of Thomas and Jane Ford, was a witness to the will of Richard Clarke.

Part of his Wolf Run property holdings was purchased in July of 1785, and may have been occupied by Richard by December of that year, for in the 15 Dec 1785 issue of the <u>Virginia Journal and Alexandria Advertiser</u>, his name appears in a list of persons who had letters to be picked up at the Post Office. The list was repeated in the issues of 23 March, 30 March, and 6 April 1786, with Richard Clarke's name appearing in all of them. The twenty-five miles from Wolf Run to Alexandria was a significant distance to travel in the eighteenth century.

It has been inferred from his sale of household goods in Alexandria in 1785, that Richard had maintained his residence in that city until that year. He had, however, owned land in the Wolf Run - Bull Run area as early as 1779, and possibly quite some time before, for we find that on 11 September 1779 "...the office of Thomas, Lord Fairfax, grants to Richard Clark, of Fairfax County, a tract of land near Bull Run, a branch of Occoquan, in the said County of Fairfax, adjoining his own (Clark's) land.....containing 94 acres..." (Northern Neck Grant Book I, p. 366).

Thus it is evident that Richard had acquired land in this area on at least three separate occasions. Nevertheless, he continued to deal in property in Alexandria as late as 1801. The individual records may seem rather dull, but when studied as a whole, they reveal much of the man. It is certain that Richard Clarke was an extremely competitive businessman, a very agressive person, and possibly, at times, a belligerent and combative man. He was involved in many suits for trespass, and on one occasion was the plaintiff in an assault and battery case.

In 1792, he is involved in a suit styled "Richard Clarke, Plaintiff vs. Marmaduke Beckwith, Defendant--In trespass pending in the County Court of Fairfax". The Wolf Run property is the land in question, and several pages of surveyor's notes are found, which precisely identify the land. Various references are made to the adjoining boundary of Captain John Waugh, and to a much earlier survey of this line made in September of 1710. No record of settlement is found, but plaintiff states satisfaction with the survey.

The Wolf Run acquisition of 1785 originally consisted of 142 acres, and was purchased from William Cocke for 65 pounds, and "other considerations". It is located in the southwestern part of the county against Occoquan Creek, and within a prominent southerly meander of that stream. The east line coincided with Wolf Run, down to its confluence with the Occoquan, and the Bull Run confluence is a short distance west of the west line. (The famous Civil War battles of First and Second Bull Run took place about eight miles northwest of here). Part of this land is now owned by the Alexandria Water Company, and was the subject of a detailed ground survey in July of 1957. A copy of this survey was obtained, and it was noted that five old burial grounds are located on or near the Clarke property.

A careful ground search, conducted in 1968, located a lonely burial ground which has long been known as the Clarke cemetery (according to Mrs. Davis, who has lived nearby for 60 years). Additional searching located eight grave stones, all of native limestone. They were covered with moss, and all were partially buried, with no visible inscriptions, save one lone date "April 2d 1865", which probably marks the last usage of this graveyard. One and one half centuries of

Virginia sun and wind and rain and frost have forever erased the record of the precise location of Richard Clarke's grave. It is reasonably certain, however, that this is the ground in which he rests.

This burial ground is about a quarter of a mile from what has been referred to as the "old Clarke cellar" by three different elderly individuals who live in the vicinity. These people had not only heard of the "old Clarke place", but one mentioned the "old Calvert place" (George Calvert was one of the witnesses to Richard Clarke's will). Whether these references apply to the original Clarke and Calvert is uncertain, but it is most interesting that the terms have survived to this day.

The spelling of the surname, Clark versus Clarke, was an arbitrary matter. Most of the documents pertaining to Richard do bear the final "e", but some do not. Since he apparently could not write (he signed his will by mark), the spelling of his name was at the mercy of the recorder. The signatures of two of his sons, Thomas and Joseph, are extant in pension applications. Joseph spelled his name Clark, and Thomas spelled it Clarke. To this day, the descendants of Thomas use the "e", while the descendants of Joseph and William do not. In compiling this history I have used the form Richard Clarke, William Clark(e), Willis Clark, etc. This too, is somewhat arbitrary, but reflects my best opinion as to the evolution of the present day spelling.

When Richard Clarke wrote his will in March of 1809, he named ten living children. It is probable that most of these were by his first wife, Elizabeth. Sally Clarke, being the only unmarried daughter at the time the will was written, was possibly his youngest child, and could have been the daughter of his second wife Sarah, and named for her. These children, probably not all in order, were:

(The missing pages complicate the interpretation of this deed of trust - There is nothing to refute the belief, expressed elsewhere, that Elizabeth is now deceased - It is probable that this trust was established for the children at the time of her death, but this is most unclear). The next deed after this one is recorded 18 Jul 1785.

1800 U. S. Census for Fairfax County, Virginia is not extant.
1810 U. S. Census for Fairfax County, p. 349: Richard Clarke, head of a family consisting of 1 male under 10 years, 1 male 16-26, 1 male 45 years and upwards, 1 female 26-45, 1 female 45 years and upwards, 5 slaves.


In 1782, personal property and land tax records indicate that Richard Clarke owned 152 acres plus one lot, and had five slaves. He lists himself and one other white male tithe from the year 1785 through 1795. In 1790 he acquires an additional 90 acres, and generally reports from 2 to 7 slaves as taxable in those years. In the year 1800 his personal property return is still approximately the same, and he is taxed on 242 acres of land. In the year 1785 a Michael Clark joins the list for the first time, and in the year 1788 we find the addition of Thomas Clark. The estate of John Clark is reported from the year 1787 as John Clark, Heirs of, and continues thus through the year 1800. In none of these years does the name of Joseph or William Clark ever appear, and it is presumed that they were living with and working for their father or someone else who included them in their list of white tithables by number and not by name. Neither of them ever had taxable land in their own name in Fairfax County.

FAIRFAX COUNTY, VIRGINIA - Deed Book, Liber A-3: pp. 80-81 - 7 Sep 1831 - Indenture recorded between William H. Leach and Patsy his wife and Alfred P. S. Windsor and Sarah his wife, all of Campbell County, Va., and James Davis of Fairfax County, Va. For \$300 James Davis bought from the aforementioned "..all our right, title and interest in and to the Lands willed and bequeathed to the said Patsy and Sarah, late Patsy and Sarah Clark, daughters of Richard Clark deceased, as will more fully and at large appear by the last Will and Testament of the said decedent..."

FAIRFAX COUNTY, VIRGINIA - Deed Book, Liber A-3: pp. 344-345 - 10 Mar 1833 - Indenture between James Davis and his wife Mary and Edward Ford. James Davis and wife sold 4 acres of the land bought from Richard Clarke's heirs in 1831. (Note previously that a Davis family is presently living on a part of the original Richard Clarke property).

HUSTINGS CCURT, Alexandria City Hall, Court Clerk's Office - Deed Book B pp. 172-175, Indentures dated 15 November 1785, between Richard Clarke, "Water man", and Michael Thorn, "Merchant". Both indentures concern sales made to Thorn by Clarke. The first pertains to the sale of a lot in the town of Alexandria - "...a certain piece parcel or Dividend of a Lott situate (sic) in the town of Alexandria,contains thirty feet on the West side of Water Street, bounded on the south by Lewis Weston on the north by Christian Skinner and runs back the depth of the said Lott numbered (not given)...." A further consideration in this transfer is noted: "...that the said Richard Clark do well and Truly indemnify and save harmless the said Michael Thorn - Against a Bond which he as Security to the said Richard Clark entered into Jointly with him to William Hunter Senior - for the sum of nine Thousand pounds of Crop Tobacco or thereabouts..." - - - The second sale to Thorn, for two hundred pounds, current money, "...a Sloop now in the Harbour of Alexandria called the Industry, Together with the rigging tackle and appearal (sic) of the said Sloop, also & Schooner in the said Harbour of Alexandria called the William, Together with the rigging.....also three Featherbeds and furniture now in the House of the said Richard Clarke Two black Walnutt Tables and eight Windsor Chairs.."

HOMAS² CLARKE (Richard¹) was born 28 August 1755 in Gloucester County, Virginia, and died 7 February 1842 in Fayette County, Kentucky. He was an apprentice ship's carpenter in Gloucester County in 1775 when he volunteered as a soldier in the American Revolution. He received a crippling wound in his left arm at the Battle of Brandywine, while serving with the 10th Regiment of the Virginia Line. Convalescent until his discharge in June of 1778, he then joined his father in Fairfax County, Virginia, where he apparently engaged in farming, although he possibly spent additional time in the shipping business in Alexandria.

On 28 January 1788 he married Jane Ford of Fairfax County, who was born 9 July 1767. She may have been a daughter of Thomas Ford, who lived adjacent to Richard Clarke in southwestern Fairfax County. She may also have been a daughter of Richard Clarke's third wife. This is presumption only, but she was unquestionably related to this family. She was said to have been "descended from the Keith family of Scotland" (Paxton's Diary - Platte County, Missouri - 1883). Jane Clarke was still living in Fayette County, Kentucky in October of 1848, at which time she made application for a widow's pension.

In 1792 Thomas and Jane Clarke moved to Fayette County, Kentucky, with Thomas' two brothers, Joseph and William. Joseph was already married at this time, but William was to marry later in Bourbon County. - - Thomas was an extensive slave-holder, and probably a farmer, but available records do not make this clear.

THOMAS CLARKE, APPLICATION FOR PENSION FOR REVOLUTIONARY SERVICE (#31675)

STATE OF KENTUCKY FAYETTE COUNTY

On this 26th day of August 1840, personally appeared Thomas Clarke a resident of the county and state aforesaid, aged Eighty five years, (on the 28th inst.) who being duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following amended declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the Act of Congress, passed June 7th, 1832.

That in the year 1775 he was residing in the County of Gloucester County in the state of Virginia, and was an apprentice to the Ship Carpenter's trade, being then about Twenty years old, that during the summer or fall of said year (1775) upon a rumor or an apprehension, that Lord Dunmore intended to return to Williamsburg and burn the City, he volunteered under Col. Buckner and marched to Williamsburg; after their arrival they continued there until relieved by Col. Jefferson, with, as was said five hundred men, how long this affiant was in service at this time he cannot state, but thinks probably two months - After the return of applicant from Williamsburg, he returned to his fathers residence in Fairfax County Va. and during the spring or summer of 1776, on the ascent of the British Fleet up the Potomac he again volunteered under Capt. Doncal (?), and marched to Mt. Vernon, to protect the property of Genl. Washington, the length of service at this time he cannot distinctly state, but thinks it did not exceed one month. That in the latter part of the fall of the same year (1776), the month not recollected, he enlisted in the army of the U. States for three years, or during the war, and served in the 10th Regiment of the Virginia Line, under the following named officers, viz: Col. Edwd Stephens, Maj. George Nicholas, Capt. Thos. West, Lieutenants John Cofer and Charles S. Broadwater, and Ensign Thomas Pierson - said enlistment took place in the

County of Fairfax County State of Virginia. He marched from thence to Baltimore, from thence to Philadelphia, and from thence to New Jersey, where in the spring of 1777 he joined the main army under the command of Genl. Geo. Washington, and there remained under the same officers until he was wounded at the Battle of Brandywine, previous to which time he was marched through various parts of New Jersey, to Trenton, Princeton, Morristown, and at one time the army made a move to the north, perhaps to Boston, but upon the arrival of the army in or near the state of New York, information was received that the British were approaching the Chesapeak, which changed the movement, and the army returned, and afterwards was fought the Battle of Brandywine, where this applicant was wounded as aforesaid. He was placed in the Hospital at Bethlehem in the State Pennsylvania, where he remained until discharged sometime in the Month of June 1778. Applicant was under a belief that his discharge was recorded in the Clerk's Office of Fairfax County Va. and got his son to write for it, which was not obtained - but in lieu of it, he received from a friend the affidavit of one of his Lieutenants, Charles S. Broadwater (now on file at the Pension Office in Washington City) - he knows of no other surviving witness by whom he can prove his services (and did not know of Lieut. Broadwater at the time he made his original declaration, to which this is an amendment).

Applicant further states, by reason of the lapse of time, old age, and the consequent laps (sic) of memory, he cannot swear positively as to the precise length of his service, or the facts above set forth, but to the best of his recollection, he served as stated above, and thinks he was in service (including his service as a volunteer, and the time he was in the hospital) at least twenty one months, and for which service he claims a Pension. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a Pension or annuity except the present; and he declares that his name is not on the Pension Rolls of any agency of any State, except on

that of the State of Kentucky as an Invalid.

Sworn and Subscribed Aug 26, 1840.

FAIRFAX CCUNTY, VIRGINIA Deed Book R-1, p. 88 - 17 Mar 1787 - - Certification by Governor Edmund Randolph of Virginia that Thomas Clarke, aged about 26 years, late a Sergeant in the 10th Virginia Regiment and whose pay was at the rate of 36 pounds per annum was disabled in the services of the United States by a wound in his left arm, which occasioned the loss of the use of it and that he is allowed the sum of 18 pounds yearly to commence from 1st January 1786. Recorded 19 May 1788. (Despite the discrepancy in age, this is unquestionably the same Thomas Clarke).

DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, REGISTRAR'S OFFICE:
Application for membership by Mrs. Lydia Clarke Todhunter Knight in 1908. Mrs.
Knight applied for membership by right of lineal descent from Thomas Clarke.
She states that Thomas Clarke was born 28 Aug 1755 in Fairfax County, Virginia, and that he died in Fayette County, Kentucky 7 Feb 1842. Mrs. Knight was the granddaughter of Lydia Clarke who was the daughter of James Clarke, son of Thomas.

Thomas and Jane Clarke are known to have had five sons, all of whom are listed in the torn pages of the family Bible, which is filed in the National Archives as a part of Thomas' application for pension. These pages also list some of Edward's children, but the remaining data on Edward's descendants are taken from Paxton's Diary (Platte County, Missouri - 1883). These children were:

Joseph Clark

OSEPH² CLARK (Richard¹) was born 15 December 1757 in Gloucester County, Virginia, and died in February of 1835 in Montgomery County, Kentucky. He was a private in the Virginia Militia during the American Revolution, and a pensioner under the act of 7 June 1832. The name of his wife has never been determined, but he married in Virginia prior to his move to Kentucky in 1792. Joseph was a farmer, and an extensive slave-holder, as were his brothers Thomas and William.

Another researcher (Worth M. Buis, Indianapolis - 1963) has compiled much erroneous data on the descendants of Joseph Clark. He lists Willis Clark as one of the sons of Joseph, when Willis was in fact the son of William, brother of Joseph (see later). Buis also states, without a shred of documentation, that a William Clark born in 1791, and who is buried next to Willis Clark in the old Clark Cemetery near Ladoga, Indiana was another son of Joseph. This is also false, and this William has been found to be the son of a Godfrey Clark of Madison County, Kentucky, with no relationship established.

Joseph Clark died intestate, and there are many deeds and notes in the record books concerning the disposal of his estate:

MONTGOMERY COUNTY, KENTUCKY Deed Bk 17/189 13 Oct 1835 - Thomas Clark, John Clark, James Clark, George Allen (wife Polly), Willis Hampton (wife Winnaford H.), William Hall (wife Jane), sell to Samuel Chism land on Summersett (sic) Creek (a branch of Hinkston) descended to them from their ancestor Joseph Clark. Signed by the above, and also Joshua Yeates, John Sewell, John McKee, Willis Boggs, Nancy Yeates. P. 190 13 Oct 1835 - Deed from heirs of Joseph Clark, lists above, and also James Hampton (who married Sidney J Clark, daughter of Joseph), and Sally Chism (wife of Samuel). P. 209 13 Oct 1835 - Heirs of Joseph Clark sell to Thomas Clark, lists same heirs, and adds of Montgomery, Shelby, and Henry Counties, Kentucky", however all certified in Montgomery Co.

MONTGOMERY COUNTY, KENTUCKY Circuit Court Suit 57/286 (1854-1864) - James Hampton et al vs. Stephen B. Smalley et al: Stephen B. Smalley, wife America Jane; Joshua Smalley, wife Armilda; Solomon Siddons, wife Mary Frances; Joseph Hampton and John Hampton vs. William Derickson, James Johnson, David Bruton, and William A. Lane. Plaintiffs say that female plaintiffs and Joseph and John Hampton are children of Mrs. Sidney Hampton who was a daughter and heir of Joseph Clark, deceased, who at his death owned about 72 acres of land on Somerset which was conveyed in his lifetime to George Allen. When their grandfather, Joseph Clark died, Sidney was married to James Hampton. She died without receiving any land. Said Joseph Clark died intestate, and left ten children, all of whom except Sidney Hampton sold their interest in the 72 acres and James Johnson now owns 9/10. The others have occupied their inheritance since the death of Joseph Clark. Others who have occupied this land are D. Bruton, W. Lane, J. Johnson, and W. Derickson (defendants).

Deposition of James Hampton - 15 Nov 1856 - Joseph Clark died about February 1835, and left Thomas Clark, James Clark, John Clark, Nancy Yeates (husband Joshua), Jane Hall (husband William), Polly Allen (husband George), Sally Chism (husband Samuel), and Winnie Hampton (husband Willis); his children. Before his death, his daughter, Elizabeth McKee died and left Polly Servell (husband John), Sally Boggs (husband Willis), John McKee and Joseph McKee. James Hampton married Sidney Clark, daughter of Joseph. She died 1833, leaving America Jane (Stephen B. Smalley), Armilda (Joshua Smalley), Mary Frances (Solomon Siddons), Joseph Hampton and John Hampton, all of whom were under 21 years of age in 1835. Mary Frances, the youngest, was born Sept 1832.

All of Hampton's daughters married before they were 21 years old. Nancy Yeates is now dead and left Patsy Darnall, Nancy Yeates, Jr., Joshua Yeates, Lucy Yeates, and Sally Yeates. - Joseph Clark lived on a strip of land next to Jake Johnson and adjoining land he bought of George Allen. He cultivated the land but Allen continued to live on it. (He was Clark's son-in-law). After Clark's death, the heirs, believing he had received back his advance, deeded the land back to Allen. (Hampton heirs claimed they didn't enter into the deed and still had claim to it). Deposition of John Clark - 5 June 1855 - Am 63 years of age. Was administrator of my father, Joseph Clark's estate. I have lived in that neighborhood since I was 18 years old and have known the land since 1810. George Allen (who married John's sister) had financial difficulties and Joseph Clark bought the land to help him out.

Deposition Thompson Clark - 5 June 1855 - I am a nephew of Joseph Clark, deceased. I think George Allen moved to the land about 1827 or 1828.

Deposition James Hampton - 11 Aug 1855 - In Brooksville, Bracken County, Kentucky - I knew Joseph Clark before I married his daughter. He lived in Montgomery County on (sic) Joshua Yeates on Grassy Lick Creek. His heirs are Elizabeth Clark McKee, Thomas Clark, Nancy Clark Yeates, James Clark, Jane Clark Scoby, Polly Clark Allen, Sally Clark Chism, Sidney Clark Hampton, Winney Clark Hampton, and John Clark. He next renames the Hampton children and says, "All of the above children are by my first wife, a daughter of Joseph Clark, deceased.

Montgomery County Kentucky tax lists for 1810 include: <u>Joseph Clark</u> Sec. #97 - 1 male over 45; 1 male 16-26; 2 males 10-16; 1 female over 45; 1 female 26-45; 2 females 16-26; 3 females 10-16; 6 slaves. <u>Thomas Clark</u> Sec. #97 - 1 male 16-26; 2 males under 10; 1 female 16-26.

MONTGOMERY COUNTY. KENTUCKY Will Book G/221 - Will of John Clark (son of Joseph) - Written 12 May 1851 - Proved April 1870 - He evidently had no children; lists wife Asenath, and children he raised, Frances Lane and Joseph Johnson. The child Frances has now married John Clark, son of his brother James Clark, and has two daughters Mary A. and Sarah D. He mentions children of my several brothers and sisters and names James Clark, Sarah Chism, and Winney Hampton. (I believe that the full name of Frances Lane may have been Amanda Frances Lane, as the wife of John Clark is shown to be Amanda F. in the 1850 census - JWC)

MONTGOMERY COUNTY, KENTUCKY Deed Book 25/173 - 15 Nov 1854 - Solomon Sydens and wife Mary F. of Putnam County, Indiana sell 1/5 of undivided tract formerly owned by Joseph Clark, deceased - being same Mary F. inherited from her mother Sidney Hampton, heir of Joseph Clark. (Identifies 5 of the children of Sidney J. Clark Hampton, see later).

MONIGOMERY COUNTY, KENTUCKY Deed Book 14/350 - 12 Aug 1829 - From Joseph Clark to David Badger, J. Masterson, James Allen, Trustees of Baptist Church - land on Somerset Creek, containing 2 acres (bound by Joseph Clark's NW corner).....

HISTORY OF SOMERSET CHRISTIAN CHURCH, by J. T. Highland - (Unpublished paper found in an old scrap book - probably written early 1900's) (This was first a Baptist Church, then changed to Christian under the teachings of John Smith, ca 1830)...

"In the year 1828 (sic), Preacher John Smith (better known as 'Raccoon' Smith) conducted a protracted meeting in the woods five miles north of Mt. Sterling on the waters of Somerset Creek. The settlement of farmers out there was known as Johnsons, Hathaways, Allens, Williams, Clarks. The meeting was a success; thirty or forty additions, who then resolved to build a church house. Mr. Clark gave two acres of land, that was one mile west of the new Somerset Church (as it now stands), work was commenced, the members dug a well 33 feet deep and today the passerby can quench his thirst from its cool water, many thousand bricks were made, four walls 80 by 50 feet erected and covered with shingles made from trees that stood on the two acres....had four doors, four six foot wood fireplaces, two 3 foot stoves,

it had a row of columns for support, it had no floor for three years, the seats were split with huge pegs 20 inches long to hold them up and they had no backs".
....(Goes on to tell of influence of Civil War - in fall of 1874, the old building burned, with a new one erected on the Maysville Pike, about I mile east. The new church is at head of a lane which leads to cemetery of Lucy Jones, William Hammonds, et al. I visited the rebuilt church in July of 1967, and inspected all of the old records - JWC).

JOSEPH CLARK, APPLICATION FOR PENSION FOR REVOLUTIONARY SERVICE - National Archives, Washington D. C. - - (#25353) (Abstract - spelling and punctuation

from the original copy) State of Kentucky - Montgomery County - On the 6th day of May 1833 personally appeared ..., Joseph Clarke a resident of said county and state aged 75 years in December last who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefits of the act of Congress passed the 7th of June 1832: That he entered the services of the U. S. under the following named officers and served as herein stated. He states that he was born in Gloucester County Virginia Dec 15th 1757. At ___ age he states he moved from said county to the County of Fairfax. He states however before he left Gloucester he entered the services of the U. S. in the month of March in the year 1776 under Capt. John Hubbard and Col. Payton as a volunteer for 18 months. In this year he states Dunmore lay at Gwynn's Island in Armisted Bay with his ___ and was encampted on the Margin of the Bay. We continued here for some considerable time and forted and as were near enough to cannonade we fought the British from the forts and after a considerable conflict we succeeded in driving away the British fleet. And from the time we reached the island above named we ranged through the country guarding the rivers. In the fall we marched to Little York and here we continued until the ("spring" crossed out) all of 1777 having endured active service as a private for 18 months from the time he first entered the services and received a discharge for that time from Lewis Booker who he thinks was a Lieutenant. He states that he returned home to the County of Fairfax, his parents having moved to that county, and immediately after his return home which was in the fall of 1777 as above stated He states he was drafted as a militiaman for three months under some Capt. rendezvoused at Alexandria and commenced our march immediately and so continued till we passed the Susquehannah. In the Environs of this place we remained for some time and owing to the British having taken winter quarters at Phildelphia and Washington at Valley Forge For this tour of three months he also secd. a discharge but by whom he has forgotten having lost it.....He states that after having performed all the services above named he had then to hire a substitute during the war which he did at considerable expence. He states that he has no record of his age but recollects it well ever since he was a schoolboy. He has stated where he was living when called into service. He says he moved to Kentucky in the year 1792 to the County of Fayett and from thence to Montgomery County and has resided ever since...... He hereby relinquishes all and every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state.

Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid.

(Other papers indicate he was allowed a pension of \$23.33 per annum - 28 Dec 1833)

With one exception, the records on the children of Joseph Clark are scanty. The exception is the family of James Clark, third son of Joseph, who married Susannah Jones. The records for this family have been meticulously preserved in the Jones Bible Record. Other data have been reconstructed from census records, cemetery inscriptions, and numerous legal records, many of which have been cited previously. These ten children, probably not in exact order, are as follow:

- JCHN3 CLARK (Joseph2 Richard1) born ca 1792 d ca 1870 Montgomery Co Ky II. m Asenith (various spellings) ___. Had no children, but raised Joseph Johnson and (Amanda)(?) Frances Lane.
- JAMES 3 CLARK (Joseph 2 Richard 1) born ca 1794 m 18 Dec 1817 in Montgomery Co III. Ky Susannah Jones born 29 Jun 1797 (she a sister of Hannah Jones, who married Willis Clark, who was a first cousin of her husband James). With their three sons, they moved to Russell Twp Putnam County Indiana ca 1849, to Clark Twp Montgomery County Indiana by 1860, and to Dallas County Iowa between 1861-64. Susannah apparently died between 1850 and 1860. Their three sons:

William Clark

ILLIAM² CLARK (Richard¹) was born ca 1759 in Gloucester County, Virginia, and died in December of 1820 in Montgomery County, Kentucky. He accompanied his brothers Thomas and Joseph on their long trek from Fairfax County, Virginia to what was then Fayette (now Bourbon) County, Kentucky, early in the year of 1792. It was there, probably very soon after his arrival in Kentucky, that he married Winifred² Nichols (John¹). By 1804, William and Winifred are known to have been in Montgomery County, but this does not necessarily mean that they moved after their marriage, because of the formation of new counties from older counties. The north half of Montgomery County (in which they lived) was formed from part of Bourbon County, which had previously been formed from a part of Fayette County. There probably was some move involved however, since the biographical sketch of Thompson Clark and his descendants (see later) refers to their marriage as having occurred in "now Bourbon" County, which is quoted above.

Winifred (Nichols) Clark was probably born ca 1775. After the 1820 census and William's death in December of that year, all trace of her is lost.

Before the discovery of the tax lists abstracted above, there remained a feeling of incompleteness in establishing the case that Willis Clark was the son of William Clark. The previous observations were sound, but circumstantial: In the 1810 Census records, William Clark was the only man with the proper surname, and with a male child in the proper age group to include Willis. This excepts the family of Joseph Clark, all of whose children are named in the Court Suit of 1856, and with Willis not included. - - A second point, highly suggestive, and almost but not quite proof is this: Willis Clark married Hannah Jones. The given names of her parents were Joseph and Lucy (Lucinda). The given names of Willis parents were William and Winifred. Willis and Hannah named their first son Joseph J ('J' for Jones (?)), their second son was named William, their first daughter was named Winifred, and their second daughter was named Lucinda. - While there would have been little doubt about the relationship at this point, the tax lists above provided the clincher. - - The close association of Willis and Thompson (documented son of William); the adjacent land ownership and tax listings of Willis, Thompson, and William, and finally, the even division of William's land and slaves between Thompson and Willis following William's death.

Biographical sketch taken from The History of Bourbon, Harrison, Scott, and Nicholas Counties, Kentucky, (1882) by William Henry Perrin, p. 527:

William Clark, farmer: P. O. Plum Lick (now Flat Rock, Bourbon Co Ky), was born March 3, 1821; his father was Thompson Clark, born Dec 2, 1792, in Montgomery Co Ky; he of William Clark, who was a native of Fairfaxl Co Virginia, but came to the State of Kentucky when a young man and married in what is now Bourbon Co, then Fayette, to a Miss Winifred Nichols. William Clark was accompanied to this state by a brother Joseph, who died in Montgomery Co, and Thomas 2 Clark, who settled in Fayette Co, where he lived and died, having served in the Revolutionary War. Thompson Clark was a soldier in the war of 1812, holding the position of orderly sergeant under Captain Crawford; regimental commander Colonel Samuel Williams. William Clark's mother was Deborah Wilson, daughter of Nathaniel and Mary (Jack's) Wilson, who were natives of Kentucky, the early Wilsons coming from New Jersey. Thompson Clark had two sons, William, and John eleven years younger, who resides in Montgomery Co Ky. William Clark received his early education in a log school house under the instruction of a Mr. Samuel Nicholson, a Pennsylvanian. Among his school mates were Colonel Thomas Johnson and Colonel John S. Williams, now United States Senator. He afterwards received instructions from various sources until about eighteen years of age. He subsequently engaged in teaching and farm work until his marriage, which occurred Nov 22, 1849, to Miss Eliza Ann Bradley of Montgomery Co, she a daughter of William and Susan (Mark) Bradley, who were natives of Montgomery Co and among the early and prominent families of this County. John Bradley was the father of William Bradley, and Susan Mark was a daughter of Robert Mark, a prominent character of Montgomery Co. The result of the marriage of William Clark were children as follows: Susan Alice, now Mrs. Calvin Gillispie, Jr., Annie B., Mollie B., now Mrs. David T. Wilson, James B., Emma, now Mrs. James Gillispie, of Nicholas County, Willa, Frankie, Ida D., Maggie L., Eliza E., and Mattie Clyde. He is of a conservative character, paying but little attention to affairs not pertaining to his business, but living a life of devotion to his family and business. He and his family are members of the Christian Church at Flat Rock, and living lives of devotion to their Christian faith.

And refers to his former declaration made under act of 284 of deplember 180 upon which he obtained a Land Warrant No. for Forty acres, which he having legally transferred and disposed of, is not within his power now to return. He further declares that he has not received a warrant for bounty land under any other act of Congress, nor made any application therefor, than the one above referred to, under act of depleteding 2821830 upon which he obtained the said Land Warrant No. for Forty acres, and the one now presented.

Willis Clark

ILLIS³ CLARK (William² Richard¹) was born in Montgomery County, Kentucky, in a cabin about four miles north of the settlement at Mt. Sterling, on the 26th of September, 1796. On the 13th of November, 1817, he married HANNAH³ JONES (Joseph² Thomas¹), with the ceremony performed by the Reverend John Smith, a famous frontier preacher. Hannah was born 13 July 1800, also in Montgomery County, Kentucky, and died 3 July 1895 in Montgomery County, Indiana. Willis died 7 August 1870 in Indianapolis, Marion County, Indiana, after having been adjudged insane in the spring of that year. Both are buried in an old abandoned graveyard 2½ miles south and 2½ miles east of Ladoga on the old Willis Clark land, owned by Harvey Long in 1967.

In 1834, Willis and Hannah, with their twelve children, and possibly some other Clarks, migrated from Montgomery County, Kentucky to a farm near the village of Brick Chapel in Monroe Township, Putnam County, Indiana. On 4 Apr 1838 Willis purchased 120 acres of land from Samuel Woodruff, the tracts consisting of the W/2 of the NW/4 and the NE/4 of the NW/4 of Sec 35 - T15N - R4W, for which he paid \$500. On 16 Nov 1852 he sold 100 acres of this land to Nancy and David Priest for \$1600. Prior to this sale, in 1851, Willis and Hannah had moved again to a farm on Upper Haw Creek, just southeast of Ladoga, Clark Township, Montgomery County, Indiana, where they had purchased 147 acres in Sec 27. This was Willis' final move.

Willis died intestate. In September of 1870, Hannah signed ("her mark") a document relinquishing her right of administration and requesting the appointment of David D. Nicholson as administrator. John Clark signed surety bond. Court proceedings are found in Order Book 6, pp. 409-414, Montgomery County, Indiana. The estate was disposed of in 1874, File Box #70. Hannah inherited one third of the land, or about 49 acres. On 5 October 1875, she deeded 10 acres to the youngest child, Fanny McNorton, who was then a widow. The remainder of her land she sold 1 March 1881 to James C. Standiford for \$1500 (Dd Bk #48, p. 247). After the death of Willis, Hannah lived among her children for 25 years. Mrs. Hattie Neff, of Park Forest Illinois, remembers Hannah Clark as "..a small woman, wore a black lace cap, walked with a cane, and smoked a clay pipe.." A celebration was held in honor of Hannah's 94th birthday, and this event was the subject of a newspaper story (see reproduction of clipping on a later page). (In early 1967, I had located a woman who had been present at this celebration, a Mrs. Bertha Payne of Fillmore, Indiana, who was a step-daughter of the W. B. Gill mentioned in the article. I had looked forward to interviewing her, but she died in April 1967, three months before I first visited the area).

From Bowen's History of Montgomery County, Indiana (1913) Vol II, p. 1101:
"..Willis and Hannah (Jones) Clark came to Putnam County, Indiana when daughter Lucinda was 6 months old, then on to Montgomery County, Clark Township, where Willis spent rest of his life. Hard working, honest, respected man. Democrat and Christian Church. Children were...(names 16, but does not mention daughter who died in infancy)...."

I. JOSEPH J⁴ CLARK (Willis³ William² Richard¹) was born 30 Dec 1818 in Montgomery County, Kentucky. His date of death has not yet been determined, but he apparently died in Putnam County, Indiana, between the years of 1850 and 1860. On 1 Jan 1843 he married Mary G² Siddons (Joseph¹), she born 1824 in Tennessee. - - Joseph's middle name is presumed to have been Jones, and he was almost certainly named for his maternal grandfather, Joseph Jones. As has been noted previously, in the account of William Clark of Kentucky, the first born son of Willis and Hannah Clark was named for Hannah's father; the second son was named William, for Willis' father; the first born daughter was named Winifred for Willis' mother (Winifred Nichols Clark); and the second daughter was named Lucinda for Hannah's mother. This observation was a small link in the mass of circumstantial evidence which identified William and Winifred Clark as the parents of Willis.

Little is known of the children of Joseph and Mary Clark. The following list may be incomplete:

II. WILLIAM T. 4 CLARK (Willis 3 William 2 Richard 1) born 1 Jan 1820 in Montgomery County, Kentucky, died 7 May 1862 at Benton Barracks, Missouri. He is buried at St. Louis, Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery Grave 710, Section 50. He married 26 Apr 1840 Mary Ann Allen, who was born 20 Jan 1823 at Greencastle, Indiana (the place of their marriage). She m/2 20 Aug 1867 Jess S. Dicks b 1802. She m/3 Miles H. Mattox b 1815 d 1 May 1893. Despite the fact that her last marriage was to Mattox (and this is the name on her marker), she was always called "Grandma Dicks" by her family. She died 7 Apr 1905 at Randall, Kansas, and is buried in the Pleasant View Cemetery between Montrose and Formoso, Kansas.

William T. Clark was enrolled in the 4th Iowa Inf Volunteers on 26 Mar 1862 at Adel, Iowa, and mustered into service as a Private on 30 Apr 1862 at Davenport, Iowa. According to official Army records, he died 7 May 1862 of "congestive chills". In an affidavit signed by Jesse S. Dicks on 7 Jan 1868 is the statement: "..William T. Clark died at hospital in St. Louis, Missouri, on or about the 11 of May 1862 of poison by eating a pie bought of the rebels, or of congestive chills, contracted in said service and in the line of his duty.... Whether his death was brought about by a poisoned pie or not, this story is traditionary in many branches of the family, and such events are documented as having occurred during this period. (New York World 12 Sep 1861: St. Louis - Mrs. Willow and a free colored woman named Hannah Courtena, were arrested yesterday for selling poisoned pies to the soldiers at Camp Benton...)

According to Army records, William T. Clark was 6° 1" tall, blue eyes, sandy hair, and a dark complexion. On three separate enlistment papers written and signed by him, he states his age to be 35 years. This was false. It is probable that the Army was not accepting men of his age at this particular time, and that he lied in order to join - and paid with his life a short time later - surely as much a hero as if he had died on the battlefield.

Some time during 1848, William and Mary Clark and their three eldest children moved to Washington Township, Dallas County, Iowa. Here they continued to farm a few miles north of the town of Adel, until William's ill-fated enlistment:

He was with John Brown through Kansas in 1859 and there engaged in a battle with the border ruffians of Missouri and captured 5 prisoners, disarmed them of their guns and horses, and then turned them loose...) After Lemuel's death, and prior to 22 Aug 1912 (at which time she was dropped from the Civil War widow's pension roll), Sarah m/2 George Shirley, but she and Lemuel are buried together in the Minburn, Iowa Cemetery. An energetic and restless man, Hiram Clark was a farmer, "horse-trader", and lay preacher in the First Christian Church. He lived in many different places in the midwest; in addition to his birthplace in Indiana, he lived in Adel, Iowa; Jewell County, Kansas; Oberlin, Logan, and Formoso, Kansas. - - As a lad of 18, he enrolled in Co C, 39th Iowa Infantry Volunteers on 9 Aug 1862, three months after his father's death. Records show him to have been convalescent at Corinth, Mississippi on 30 Apr 1863, and he was a participant in the Vicksburg campaign with General Sherman's XVth Corps. He was mustered out of service in Washington, D. C. on 5 Jun 1865, having been on the "march to the sea". He returned to Adel, Iowa, and married Matilda Elizabeth Slaughter some four months later. He and Matilda moved to Jewell County, Kansas in late 1871 or early 1872. In the Atlas of Jewell County, Kansas (Gillen and Davy 1884), we find: H. P. Clark: E 3/4 of N/2 Sec 35-T3S-R7W (Washington Twp). This land is located 22 mi S and 2 mi E of what later became the townsite of Montrose. IV. NATHAN⁴ CLARK (Willis³ William² Richard¹) was born in Montgomery County, Kentucky 17 Mar 1823 and died in Dallas County, Iowa 28 Sep 1907. He is buried in the Garoutte Cemetery northwest of Adel. A life-long bachelor, he made his home with his brother Milton, until after Milton's death in 1874. He continued to farm in the area, holding various township offices, and is still remembered by elder people in central Dallas County as a highly respected citizen. He was said to have been a fine violin player, as were several of his brothers.

XIV. ALEXANDER CAMPBELL⁴ ("CAM") CLARK (Willis³ William² Richard¹) was born 16 Oct 1838 in Putnam County, Indiana, and died 6 Aug 1920 Minburn, Iowa. He married 11 Dec 1859 Nancy Bly born 3 Aug 1841 Indiana died 14 Feb 1932, both buried at Minburn.

"Cam" and Nancy moved from Indiana to Washington Township, Dallas County, Iowa, in 1864, after the birth of their first two children. About 1902 they moved again, settling on a farm three miles north and one mile east of Brewster, Kansas. Later they purchased land just west of Brewster. One of their grand-daughters recalls that they were visited on several occasions here by "Hi" (Hiram Preston) Clark, and "Aunt Fannie" McNorton (Fannie Clark, youngest child of Willis and Hannah Clark, and widow of Andrew J. McNorton).

About 1915 or 1916 "Cam" and Nancy returned to Minburn, Iowa, where they remained until their deaths. A life-long farmer, "Cam" was known as a fine violinist, and his son Harvey and his grandson Earl also played that instrument. His original violin is now in the possession of his grand-daughter, Mrs. Virgil Thomas, of Englewood, Colorado. A daughter of Mrs. Thomas has the Alexander Clark family Bible, from which many of the missing birthdates of the children of Willis and Hannah Clark were obtained.

During the last ten years of his life, "Cam" was plagued with failing eyesight, and during the last two or three years, he became totally blind.

This pioneer pair had fourteen children, nine of whom survived to raise families of their own.

The five children who did not survive are all buried in the Garoutte Cemetery, located four miles north and one mile west of the town of Adel. This is a very lovely and secluded burial ground, which I first visited in the summer of 1967. There is much Clark history here; in addition to the five children of Alexander and Nancy Clark, the graves of James W. Clark (son of Milton), Nathan Clark (bachelor brother of Alexander), and John G. Clark (youngest son of William T.) are to be found. A marker at the entrance of the cemetery is inscribed "Jennie, wife of G. M. Clark, died July 1, 1880, Ae 19y-4m-8d". She is believed to be the first wife of George M. Clark, an early-day attorney in Adel, and no known relation, but all the other Clarks here are descendants of Willis and Hannah Clark. - The markers for the five children, with the inscriptions badly faded and soon to be illegible, stand as a mute testimonial to the toll taken by disease during this period. The oldest, Rosa L., died at the age of three years, and the others - Otha Floyd, Maud, and the twins Lolabelle and Lulabelle lived for only a few months.

BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION.

On July 13, 1800, in Montgomery Co., Ky., Hannah Jones was born. She had six slaters null three brothers, backing a family of ten. In 1817 she was married to Willis Clark, 'In 1831 they moved to Indiana and settled on a farm near Brick Chapel, in Potuam county. In 1851 they moved again to a farm on Upper Haw Creek where they remained until the death of the bushand, August, 1879. Since that time the widow has most of the time lived around with her children, but calling her home with her danghter Lucinda Baker, near New Bass, Ind.

Friday, July 13, 1894 being her ninety-fourth birthday, her children arranged to celebrate her anniversary at the Haw Creek Church. A large concourse of the Hadred and friends assembled at 10 o'clock a. m. and the foreness was spent in a 'visiting way. There were many happy meetings and tears of joy flowed feerly. At noon a bountiful feast was spread, the like of which was nover equals! before in this country. Tube, baskets, boxes and pais were emptled out on the long table prepared for the occasion and the half could not find room, so spreads were made all around the house in the shade of the locus trees.

After the feast, basket full after basket full was gathered up.

At one o'check the multitude as-sembled in the church-house and engaged in an appropriate song service, conducted by W. B. Gill. A pathetic and carnest prayer was offered by Eld. John Clark, of Adel, Iowa. Frank Gill, statistician of the occasion, then gave an account of the genealogy of Hannah Jones Clark. To her were korn 17 chlidren -ten sons and seven daughters, and there being no twins. Ten are still living, 6 boysamil triris, all of whom were pre-out at the reind, and Oliver of Pallis Co., lowa. Fourteen of the children lived to be grown and married. One died an infant, and Frank died at the age of 19 years, in Putnem Co. Nathen, of lows, never married, choosing rather the bliss of a bachelor's life. Mary, 2d wife of Geo. Morris, died Aug. 18. 1893; ; without decendents. B. F. Clark, south of Ladoga, has no offspring, yet he has been more philan-thropic than them alt. He and his good wife have adopted and raised
